THE PIER - STAGES 2 AND 3 RECEIVES DEVELOPMENTAL APPROVAL

Following the Council's approval of Stage 1 of The Pier development, the Shire has now received an application for Stages 2 and 3 of the development for the Council to consider.

The proposed development site is located at the western end of Robinson Street (the main street within the Carnarvon townsite) where it intersects with Olivia Terrace – via a roundabout - which extends along the Fascine waterway (formerly the south arm of the Gascoyne River). It is a prominent landmark site within the Carnarvon town centre, with outlooks onto Robinson Street, along Olivia Terrace (north and south), the Fascine waterway, and across to Babbage and Whitlock Islands. Stage 1 consists of a 4-storey multiple-dwelling complex comprising 35 dwellings with private balconies with a mix of bedrooms/sizes with the following for further stages:

Stage 2 will encompass commercial, retail and office tenancies on the ground and first floors; a continuous covered colonnade along the Robinson Street façade will link all major commercial and office access; and centrally located will be the lobby for the offices and for the hotel which will occupy the top two storeys of the stage. Private covered car-parking areas and storage and service facilities are included in this second stage, integrated with those of Stage 1.

The rooms and suites of the hotel will be 'twin-keyed' managed by one of the premier accommodation providers in Australia (Operator). That same Operator will subsequently operate the Hotel component of Stage 3.

Stage 3 will encompass short-stay residential apartments of one and two bedrooms, with private balconies; extensive common outdoor areas which will subsequently serve as the outdoor hub for the fully developed three stages; private carparking areas and storage and service facilities.

It is a rare opportunity for a landmark site, in a regional context, to be considered viable for development. "The Pier" is intended as a benchmark regional development proposing quality urban design and desired mixed-use outcomes. It is intended to be a development of longevity, public relevance and civic significance underpinning the heart of Carnarvon.

Council resolved to support the officer's recommendation to approve the development application with a number of conditions. These are detailed in the minutes of the Council meeting which can be found on the Shire's website www.carnarvon.wa.gov.au

PREPARATION OF A COASTAL HAZARD RISK MANAGEMENT AND ADAPTATION PLAN (CHRMAP) TENDER AWARDED TO LAND INSIGHTS

The Coastal Management Plan Assistance Program (CMPAP) is a Western Australian Planning Commission (WAPC) initiative, administered by the Department of Planning, Lands and Heritage (DPLH).

The primary objective of CMPAP is to support the State Planning Policy 2.6 State Coastal Planning Policy (SPP2.6) and associated policies by providing grants to coastal land managers to prepare and implement plans and strategies that:

- plan for long-term management of areas that are, or are predicted to become, under pressure from challenges including the impacts of climate change, coastal hazards such as erosion and inundation, population growth, and competing land uses;
- develop community appreciation for the coast as a contested space and facilitate informed community input into local decision making about coastal planning issues.

Applications were invited for grants of up to \$200,000.The Shire applied for, and was successful in an application for funding under this program to develop a Coastal Hazard Risk Management Adaption Plan (CHRMAP) for the Shire of Carnarvon. A Tender process was undertaken seeking a suitable consultant to undertake the work to develop the CHRMAP.

With Land Insights' recent work history in the Carnarvon area and because the Land Insights team are all specialist in their field of expertise Council were in agreeance with them being awarded the tender.

REZONING WILL ALLOW CORAL COAST VETS TO RELOCATE TO NEW PREMISES.

The Shire has received a proposal from Coral Coast Vets (Dr Emma Barrett) with regards to establishing a veterinary centre at her property at Lot 195 (HN 231) Robinson Street, Morgantown which is zoned Light Industry. A veterinary centre is a 'X' use within a Light Industry zone. A scheme amendment has subsequently been prepared to enable the Shire to consider a future development application for the business.

Council approved the amendment which will now be submitted to the Minister for Planning for approval.

CARNARVON YOUTH PRECINCT REVITALISATION PROJECT PUMP TRACK ONE STEP CLOSER

An election commitment of \$80,000 was received by the Shire for the renewal of the existing skate park on Babbage Island Road, immediately outside the Aquatic Centre. The Shire was able to use that funding to leverage additional funds from Lotterywest to create a larger Youth Precinct with a new Pump Track facility at Hutchison Park. Hutchinson Park is located on Babbage Island Road, adjacent to the Aquatic Centre and Skate Park.

Community consultation was conducted in 2021 around the concept of the Pump Track being developed at Hutchison Park to assist develop the business case to Lotterywest for funding. Preliminary concept plans were provided at the funding launch for the Pump Track and Skate Park, known as the Carnarvon Youth Precinct Revitalisation project. Feedback from neighbouring streets was received in October 2022 where a number of concerns were addressed. These have been noted and will form part of the formal consultation for the Design phase of the project.

Tender RFT 03/2023 for the new Pump Track was advertised for 3 weeks and closed on 1 March 2023. At close of the tender, three submissions were received

Landscape Australia Construction were awarded the tender to the the design and construction works for the pump track due to their significant experience in the industry, from pump tracks to playgrounds and has delivered similar projects for other Local Governments in regional locations.

FIRST CLASS CONSTRUCTIONS WA PTY LTD AWARDED CONTRACT TO RECONSTRUCT SECTION OF ROBINSON STREET

Reconstruction of a section of Robinson Street from its intersection with Olivia Terrace to the intersection with Camel Lane on the eastern carriageway (traffic into town) only is required. The current layout of this section of Robinson St was constructed in 2010/11 as part of the Carnarvon Town Centre and Fascine Redevelopment.

Affected businesses along the section of Robinson street where reconstruction works are to take place were invited to attend information sessions. Two consultation sessions were completed. The initial session in May 2022 determined general considerations to be included in the design process. The second session held in November 2022 provided the proposed preliminary design plans.

A strong preference from stakeholders for the work to be completed after the solar eclipse period was expressed.That will be met under the current proposed project timeframe..

Council awarded the contract to First Class Constructions WA Pty Ltd wtih commencement of site works due to commence 1 August 2023 with the project anticipated to take approximately 12 weeks. It is unlikely the whole of the road will be closed for that period. Further work will be undertaken with the recommended contractor to minimise actual closures to the road during construction and the specification includes requirements to ensure pedestrian access to the affected businesses during the works.

The condition of the main street continues to deteriorate. Recently completed remedial works were intended to improve the appearance in the main street prior to the solar eclipse event and offset some of the road surface degradation. At the core of the matter however, inadequate drainage will continue to impact pavement performance after any wet weather event and similar defects such as significant potholing and prolonged inundation during and after rain events remain likely to occur until the drainage improvements and pavement remediation occur.

Council agreed to accept the submission from First Class Constructions WA Pty Ltd to proceed with the project to remediate this long standing issue.

NOMINATION OF PROJECT(S) FOR ALLOCATION OF FUNDING FROM LOCAL ROADS AND COMMUNITY INFRASTRUCTURE PHASE 4 – TRAMWAY BRIDGE SELECTED

At the March Council meeting, Council resolved to allocate significant funding from the LRCI funding program to the renewal and restoration of an iconic heritage and much-loved community asset, the Tramway Bridge.

The LRCI Program supports Local Governments to deliver priority local road and community infrastructure projects to stimulate additional infrastructure construction activity, and growth. It aims to create jobs in local communities following the impacts of COVID-19 and deliver benefits to communities such as improved road safety, accessibility and visual amenity. In February 2023 the Federal Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Communications (Department) announced LRCI Phase 4, under which the Shire would receive \$844,041 in funding for a project that would benefit the community. Funding will be available from 1 July 2023 with construction to be completed by 30 June 2025. After some debate, Council resolved to allocate the LRCI Phase 4 funding to the restoration of the Tramway Bridge.

LRCI funding does not require a Local Government contribution and can be used to leverage additional external funding. The LRCI Phase 4 funding will be included as part of the Budget 2023/24 budget considerations.

The Department has a further \$250 Million available within the LRCI Program in addition to that already committed to Phase 4. Allocation of these additional funds is likely to be announced shortly. It is reasonably anticipated that the Shire will receive further LRCI funding with details pending advice from the Department.

While the Tramway Bridge Restoration was nominated as a priority, other projects that are aligned to the Shire's Strategic Community Plan were considered and will be developed to be shovel-ready for other potential funding opportunities. These projects are:

Project 2 - Plaza/RV Friendly Park
Project 3 - Baxter Park Adventure Land
Project 4 - Brockman Park Nature Garden

We look forward to seeing the Tramway Bridge restored for current and future generations of residents to enjoy. While we appreciate that renewal is not as exciting as new developments, we also recognise the importance of protecting and preserving the amazing assets we have.



TOWN BEACH UPGRADES COMPLETED

Local Contractors have completed maintenance and renewal works on the toilet facilities located at Town Beach, so we are pleased to advise that this important community facility is now re-opened!

In recognition of the importance of looking after our assets, the works have included upgraded lighting, refurbished plumbing and replacement Colorbond interior & exterior cladding.


These works complete the overall upgrade to the Town Beach since January, with the addition of hand-crafted seating around the playground and the installation of shade sails during February over the playground and kiosk.

Improved amenities for Town beach users have been funded by the Federal Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program and the Department of Jobs, Tourism, Science & Innovation in the lead up to the Total Solar Eclipse next month.









BLOOMING BEDS ROLLED OUT IN ROBINSON STREET

Planted back in December in collaboration between @clontarf and the Shire, six wicking beds have been delivered to the Main Street on Wednesday 22 March. After a few months of care by the Parks & Gardens Team at the Shire Depot, the plantings have taken root and were taken to their new homes in Robinson Street within the town CBD.

WHAT IS A WICKING BED?

So what is a wicking bed? Invented by an Australian named Colin Austin, the idea is that you prevent water from leaving the bottom of the bed with a waterproof liner or layer. This creates a reservoir of water beneath the soil. Then, rather than you then having to irrigate by watering from above (via drip irrigation, a hose, watering can etc), the water literally wicks up into the soil from below, keeping it nice and moist. You prevent the weight of the soil from squashing all the water out and making a muddy mess by having the water sit in amongst a layer of small stones, sand, or similar, which is able to accommodate the water whilst bearing the weight of the soil (and your prize pumpkins etc) without collapsing. You prevent the soil from dropping down into gaps between the stones or sand particles with a sheet or layer of something that lets water wick up but stops soil moving down. The last essential piece of the wicking bed puzzle is that you need a designated overflow point so that the soil layer doesn't get flooded and kill the soil life and plants by rotting their roots.



SHIRE DO AN OLLIE FROM SCHOOL HOLIDAY PROGRAM INTO SKATE PARK WORKS

Works commenced Tuesday 31 January on Stage One of the Skate Park refurbishment. The works include removing existing park furniture to allow access for concrete works and upgrades to furniture.

Stage Two, being the repainting of the Skate Park, will commence in coming months – exact dates will be advertised. Future stages, funded by Lotterywest include refurbished basketball courts, and a pump track installation across the road in Hutchinson Park will result in a fully refurbished "Youth Precinct".

Safety barriers will be in place whilst works are underway, with the skate park itself still open for use



PAVILION WORKS COMPLETED IN TIME FOR 2023 SEASON

Refurbishment works totalling \$170,000 have been completed at the Baston Pavilion, located at Carnarvon Festival Grounds in East Carnarvon prior to the commencement of the junior soccer season which has kicked off pre-season training.

Completed by local contractors, extensive refurbishment works included resurfaced floors in the kitchen and function room, additional and upgraded lighting fixtures, replacement of toilets, refurbishment of changerooms, external wall sheeting, security screen replacements, replacement service counter between the kitchen and verandah, refurbished ceilings in function room and kitchen and the upgrade of internal fittings and fixtures. The refurbishment project was funded by the federal Local Roads and Community Infrastructure programme, with a co-contribution from the Shire.

Already utilising the improved space during preseason preparations, Carnarvon Junior Soccer Association President Brenden Law-Davis says "The CJSA will definitely benefit from the many improvements. It is now a space which is cleaner, safer and place we are proud to call our Club's home. We are now looking forward to the 2023 season and utilising the venue to its full potential. Thank you to the Shire of Carnarvon and our local tradies for the fantastic upgrade."

All parking with the ACROD sign is designated for people with a disability and have an ACROD permit visible on the vehicle dash. You might also like to consider this additional reminder about the importance of keeping ACROD bays available for those who need them most.

PARKING ON FOOTPATHS, MEDIAN STRIPS AND ROUNDABOUTS

Footpaths are for the safe passage of pedestrians and are commonly shared with wheelchair users and parents with prams. You are not allowed to park your vehicle or any part of your vehicle on or over a footpath as this will cause an obstruction.

It is also unacceptable to park a vehicle on a median strip, traffic island or roundabout. These controls divide traffic to make driving on busy roads safer.

PARKING FINES AND INFRINGEMENTS

Receiving a parking infringement is not something that anyone enjoys and, in many cases, the fine can be avoided.

Enforcement is the last resort in the Shire's effort to ensure that it is as easy as possible for everybody to park and move around throughout the Shire.

A few simple tips will help you to avoid incurring a fine:

- Ensure that you carefully read and follow any parking signs.
- Refrain from parking in No Stopping areas, No Parking areas, Loading Zones, in Bus Stops and bays.
- Do not park on a verge where signage prohibits the action, on verges without permission from the property owner, in bays for other types of vehicles (e.g. motorcycles, bicycles, taxis), in rights of way, in a way that obstructs a driveway or footpath or facing against the traffic flow.
- Ensure you have parked your vehicle within the lines or area permitted.
- If you have a current ACROD permit ensure it is clearly visible.
- Parking the same as another illegally parked vehicle does not make you exempt from an infringement notice.






BURNING PERMITS AND BUSH FIRE CONTROL

CYCLONE - BE PREPARED!

- On average five cyclones occur off Western Australia's (WA) north-west coast each year, of these, two directly impact the coast and affect local communities. In Western Australia (WA) cyclone season starts in November and continues through to April. During this time coastal regions of WA are at risk of being impacted by cyclones.
- Preparing your family and your property for a cyclone is your responsibility, this includes being familiar with the meanings of cyclone alerts and warnings. People also need to take proper precautions and responsibility for their own welfare, prepare property inside and out and develop a cyclone plan to ensure their safety.
- Planning before the cyclone season can help save lives, minimise property damage and help your family to cope during a cyclone.
- Experiencing a cyclone can be frightening and traumatic. After a cyclone, many essential services may not be working, roads may be closed, food and water could be in short supply and your property or livelihood could be damaged.
- The strong winds produced by a cyclone (up to 280 kilometres per hour) can cause injury, loss of life, major structural damage to communities, disruption of utility and telecommunication services, and turn debris into dangerous missiles.
- Cyclone activity produces strong onshore winds and flooding rains increasing the threat of storm surge. This is a rapid rise in sea level that accompanies a cyclone as it moves ashore.
- People can drown or be fatally injured during or after a cyclone by collapsing buildings and moving debris during severe winds.
- Having an emergency kit is an important step to prepare and protect your household for unforeseen events and is essential for short term survival providing vital items for you, your family or household. It is a good idea to always keep your kit in a handy place known to everyone in the household.
- Cyclone Olwyn was the most significant cyclone to affect the Gascoyne coast in decades. Olwyn impacted Carnarvon on the 13th March 2015, causing minor to moderate damage to homes and infrastructure, significant damage to the power network, disruptions to water supply and significant damages to plantations and cropping.

CYCLONE SEASON IS HERE!

Carnarvon is in a Cyclone area.

It is important that every household and business be in a state of readiness in case of impact. There are some simple things you can do to ensure the safety of your life and the life of others as well as your pets and home.

SBLUE ALERT- Get ready for a cyclone

When a blue alert is issued, you need to get ready to put your plan into place.

WHAT TO DO NOW:

- Keep up to date with the latest on the cyclone through radio, television and online.
- Remind everyone in the household of the cyclone plan they committed to.
- Locate your emergency kit (and if you're planning to relocate, add the additional items).
- Secure items such as boats, caravans, trailers, garden sheds, rainwater tanks, outdoor furniture, loose material and rubbish around your home and work.
- · Check in with friends and neighbours to make sure they are getting prepared to.

SYELLOW ALERT- Act now to stay safe

If you don't take action now, the safety of you and your family are at risk.

WHAT TO DO NOW:

- Keep up to date with the latest on the cyclone through radio, television and online Particularly storm surge advice.
- · Put your plan in place. Go to your nearest welfare centre if you have planned to.
- Put fuel in your vehicle and park it in a sheltered area with the handbrake on and in park or first gear.
- · Fasten all cyclone screens, board up or heavily tape exposed windows. Close your curtains and lock your doors.
- · If you live in a low-lying area and the cyclone will create a storm surge, you may be advised to relocate now.

RED ALERT- Shelter now

You need to take shelter immediately. It's too late to be getting prepared now.

WHAT TO DO NOW:

- · Keep listening to your portable radio for information on the cyclone's progress, don't rely on your mobile phone.
- Check that your pets are safely sheltered.
- Turn off your electrical and gas supply valves.
- · Go immediately to the place where you planned to shelter in your home.
- Stay inside until the ALL CLEAR is given.

ALL CLEAR- Be Careful

When an ALL CLEAR is given it means the cyclone has passed, but you must be aware of hazards that may have been caused by the cyclone.

WHAT TO DO NOW:

- Check that your family and pets are safe and well.
- Listen to the radio and follow advice from authorities.
- Always wear shoes if you need to go outside. Be careful of fallen powerlines and trees, damaged water and sewerage lines, loose roof sheeting and other materials.
- Keep electrical appliances off until checked by a qualified tradesperson, and never use matches, cigarette lighters
 or naked flames as there may be a gas leak.
- If your property has sustained serious damage and you need help, call the SES on 132 500 for assistance. For life
 threatening emergencies, call 000.











DREDGING PLAN FOR CANARVON FASCINE RELEASED

Minister Rita Saffioti MLA has today (16.3.23) announced the McGowan Government will undertake a \$3 million dredging project to improve ocean access from the Carnarvon Fascine. The project will also include works to stabilise the sand spit. This is fantastic news for the Carnarvon community, including boat owners.

Furthermore, this announcement is the result of the close collaboration between Transport WA, the Shire of Carnarvon, Gascoyne Development Commission and Carnarvon Yacht Club.

The measure is part of the \$7 million multifaceted Carnarvon Fascine Entryway and Boat Harbour Pen Project, announced in 2020, to deliver improved ocean access for boat owners in Carnarvon.

As part of the same project, in August last year the McGowan Government opened 16 new boat pens in the Carnarvon Boat Harbour worth \$2.1 million.

Build up of sediment has restricted ocean access from the entryway of the Fascine, particularly for members of the Carnarvon Yacht Club.

Over the past two years Transport WA has been closely monitoring the movement of sediment in the Fascine entryway, and the option to undertake dredging was confirmed after technical studies showed that built options to improve vessel access were not viable long-term solutions.

To efficiently use public resources and avoid the duplicate costs of remobilising the dredge, DoT will also bring forward its planned dredging of Carnarvon boat harbour and Teggs Channel. The dredging work will be supported by an Environmental Impact Assessment and Dredging Environmental Management Plan.

The dredging work is planned for June 2023.

APRIL 2023 - UPDATE

Province Resources' green hydrogen HyEnergy® Project has moved into an important new phase with the formal commencement of pre-feasibility studies on the project.

The Pre-Feasibility Study, or PFS, provides a greater level of detail on the technical and commercial features of the project. It is generally conducted by an external engineering services firm. Province recently appointed global engineering services firm GHD to undertake the downstream PFS. This covers production and shipping facilities, which would be located at the Town Common north of Carnarvon.

The scope of the study includes water production, electrolysis, air separation for nitrogen production, ammonia synthesis and product storage, loading and export. The company will soon be awarding a tender by the upstream PFS, which will cover wind turbines, solar panels and a distribution network which will feed into the downstream facilities. Province CEO and Managing Director David Frances said the awarding of the downstream PFS was a significant milestone for the HyEnergy® Project.

"We were pleased with the calibre of bidders for this work and we're delighted to have GHD undertaking the downstream PFS," Mr Frances said. "GHD has the strong engineering capability required to advance this stage of the feasibility studies on such an exciting project."

The PFS studies for both the upstream and downstream components of the project are expected to be completed within six months.

Province recently completed a marine geophysical survey to better understand the requirements for constructing a port for the HyEnergy® Project. Conceptual plans for the port include a loading jetty, cyclone haven for tugs and a materials offloading facility. Landside facilities would include production operations, light industrial areas and opportunities for third party users. Mr Frances said a port at Carnarvon would potentially open up other opportunities for existing industries in the Gascoyne, or pave the way to establish new industries.

"While the port would primarily service the HyEnergy® Project, it is clear there are a number of additional stakeholders that would benefit from such a facility," Mr Frances said.

Additional environmental surveys for Fauna and Flora have also been recently concluded over a number of stations involved in the project, with a third round to commence later this year. The company has commenced formal discussions with the Yinggarda Aboriginal Corporation on an Indigenous Land Use Agreement, with both parties expressing hope that negotiations can be concluded as quickly as possible.

Province has also been busy in the community. Earlier this year we supported the Carnarvon Windfest, which ran over four days incorporating, windsurfing, wing foiling, kiteboarding, stand-up paddleboarding and Windrush catamaran racing. The event attracted more than 100 riders, surfers and sailors.

In April we are sponsoring the Shire of Carnarvon's 2023 Solar Eclipse Festival. Sponsorship will be supporting events and activities showcasing Carnarvon and Coral Bay as premium holiday destinations.

Province is currently progressing the HyEnergy® Project on its own with the expiry of an agreement with Total Eren regarding the development.







Quobba Blowholes Aboriginal Recognition Project Progresses

The GDC are thrilled to see progress on the Quobba Blowholes Aboriginal Recognition Project, with cement ready to be poured in the coming weeks and fabrication of the shelter well underway.

The GDC formed a working group in 2020 with Shire of Carnarvon, National Indigenous Australians Agency, Baiyungu Aboriginal Corporation, Yinggarda Aboriginal Corporation and the Carnarvon community who have worked together to deliver a design that includes a day-use shelter with interpretive signage.

The shelter will provide a place for both Aborignial people, tourists and residents of surrounding areas a point to visit and connect with the area.

The shelter and signage will also provide a place for people to learn about the rich Aboriginal cultural history, and the lands on which they are visiting.

We are also excited to share that the artwork contract has been given to Mr Raymond Edney and the structure contract was awarded to Trac Building Service.

This project is being proudly delivered by the GDC and has been collaboratively funded by The GDC, Shire of Carnarvon and Rio Tinto.

The Quobba Blowholes Aboriginal Recognition Project is expected to be delivered in time for NAIDOC week in July.

Gascoyne Development Commission form Youth Working Group


The GDC, in collaboration with the Shire of Carnarvon, have established a new working group to address Carnarvon's social issues, in particular the increase in youth crime. In 2022, The Shire of Carnarvon developed an Intensive Family and Community Intervention proposal to address anti-social behaviour through consultation with the community and stakeholders. The proposal will provide intensive wrap-around support to at-risk youth and families in crisis.

The Shire's proposal has been a springboard to promote further discussion and focus on place-based solutions. The implementation of a model that meets the requirements of the Carnarvon Community is the priority for the working group. The GDC is also working closely with the Department of Communities to gain an understanding of what youth services are currently being delivered in Carnarvon. This service mapping will allow a clear picture of where there are opportunities to improve service effectiveness and will enable a more collaborative approach to decision-making for the whole community.

The working group's objectives align with the GDC's strategic priorities including building collaborative and trusted partnerships and improving liveability across the region.

CENOTAPH RECEIVES CARE AND ATTENTION BEFORE 100TH BIRTHDAY

Refurbishment works have been completed on the Cenotaph in the lead up to the ANZAC Day Dawn Service and the 100th anniversary since its construction in 1923.

Shipped from Perth to Carnarvon in 1923, the Memorial stands as it did when first erected, constructed of Donnybrook Sandstone topped by Soldier Billy, the bronze figure added in 2015.

The Shire of Carnarvon budgeted funds for the 2022/2023 maintenance program which allowed for Westerley's to trim and tidy the surrounding trees and Faithfull's Painting to clean and prepare the surface of the Cenotaph, protect plaques and attachments before painting with protective coats for the pictured finish.

Combined with the new flagpoles installed with assistance from generous community members via a fundraising effort, the overall result is a stately site for the ANZAC Dawn Service hosted by the RSL Carnarvon commencing 5:50am on Tuesday 25 April 2023.




