SISTER CITY CATCH UP

The Shire of Carnarvon recently met with Sister Council partners the City of Cockburn while attending the annual Western Australian Local Government Association Conference in Perth. The Shire was represented by President Cr Eddie Smith, Deputy President Cr Burke Maslen, CEO Andrea Selvey, and Cr Alexander Fullarton. In attendance for the City of Cockburn was Mayor Logan Howlett, Acting CEO Victoria Green, Manager of Advocacy and Engagement Daniel Newman JP, and Manager of Transformation Michael Swanepoel.

Following the meeting, Shire President Cr Eddie Smith said he looks forward to the ongoing partnership with the City of Cockburn. "The meeting with the City of Cockburn generated valuable insights and knowledge sharing which benefits our respective regions," said Cr Smith.

The Shire develops partnerships with government and non-government organisations to achieve positive outcomes for the Carnarvon region through the exchange of strategies, ideas, and information. The agreement with the City of Cockburn was formally accepted by Carnarvon Council in February 2022 following correspondence and conversations with the CEO and the Mayor for the City of Cockburn from August 2021.

The City of Cockburn is a metropolitan local government area located within the southern suburbs of Perth, Western Australia, and is comprised of a population of more than 100,000 residents.

The Shire develops partnerships with government and non-government organisations to achieve positive outcomes for the Carnarvon region. The agreement with the City of Cockburn was formalised in February this year following correspondence since August 2021.





COUNCIL RECONSIDERS PREVIOUS DECISION TO ADOPT PROPOSED BASIC SCHEME AMENDMENT

Following deliberation with Council at a Corporate Information Session (CIS) regarding the difficulty in honoring the previous resolution, Council reconsidered its decision made at the September 2022 Council Meeting to adopt the proposed 'basic' scheme amendment as originally presented.

The matter as presented to Council at the Ordinary Council meeting held on 27 September 2022 was to support the amendment in principle subject to rezoning the current POS to residential to create waterfront lots.

Following discussion with the applicant on what the above option actually means, it is the officer's understanding that the rezoning of the POS to residential would modify the basic scheme amendment to a standard or possibly even a complex scheme amendment, which would not only take much longer to complete and thereby delaying subdivision approval but would also have an increased cost associated with it. This is mainly due to additional environmental studies that would have to be undertaken due to the POS area being located within the Special Control Area 3: Flood Prone Area. The flow-on effect of this could be increased land prices that would arguably make it harder to develop, which is counter-intuitive to what we all want to see happen in Carnarvon.

It is common knowledge that Carnarvon is currently experiencing a high demand for good quality housing supply and this amendment, if supported, would facilitate the release of the aforementioned subdivision resulting in the creation of 33 additional lots to enter the market in a highly sought-after area. Considering the above it is requested that Council initiate a basic scheme amendment to LPS13 to:

- Rezone part of Lot 9001 on Plan 402324 from 'Urban Development' zone to the 'Residential R20' zone; and
- Amending the Scheme Map accordingly.
-

Consequentially, the amendment will have minimal effect on the scheme or landowners in the area and in consultation with the DPLH, it has been directed that the rezoning is 'basic' as it is consistent with the planning framework and is administrative in nature.

The Scheme Amendment report has outlined the rationale to rezone part of Lot 9001 from the 'Urban Development' zone to 'Residential R20' zone. It is considered that through this Scheme Amendment, future subdivision and development opportunities will be available to support the continued growth of Carnarvon.

GOVERNANCE REVIEW PROGRESS PROVIDED TO COUNCIL

On 8 January 2018, the Deputy Director General of the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries (the Department) authorised an inquiry under section 8.3(2) of the Local Government Act 1995 involving the Shire of Carnarvon.

The inquiry was carried out under section 8.3(2) of the Local Government Act 1995; the Governance Review considered the compliance of the Shire of Carnarvon under various aspects of the Local Government Act 1995 and various subsidiary regulations.

The nature of the Inquiry was to encompass aspects of the Shire and associated business entities that has, has had, may have, or may have had dealings with the Shire, and the operations and practices related to tendering, procurement, and financial management from 1 January 2011 to the present day.

A recommendation from the Inquiry Report, was that the Shire of Carnarvon was to undertake a Governance Review which needed to be made available to the Director General of the Department. That review was carried out by Hammond and Woodhouse in May 2021 and their report dated 2 June 2021 was formally received by Council at the Ordinary Meeting of Council on 16 June 2021. At this same meeting, Council resolved to "Work with the Chief Executive Officer to develop an action plan to implement the recommendations with the action plan to be presented to Council formally by 28 September 2021."

The Governance Review and the recommendations were presented to Council at the Ordinary Council Meeting on 26 October 2021, to ensure transparency and to work towards achieving 100% compliance with the recommendations. Since the October meeting, the Shire has been reviewing and implementing the recommendations on a regular basis.

Out of the 25 recommendations the Shire has achieved 60% of the recommendations and are on track to complete most of the recommendations by 30 June 2022; the breakdown is as follows:

COUNCIL OFFICERS TO PURSUE FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES FOR SOLAR ECLIPSE PROJECTS



Planning for the Total Solar Eclipse (TSE) occurring in April 2023 is well progressed. Carnarvon is planning to celebrate the 2023 Solar Eclipse by hosting events that showcase the town's unique culture and history. The festival will focus primarily on the local community, through activating existing assets and the creation of inclusive, cost-free activities. The exact program will depend on the success of funding applications with JTSI and Lotterywest, noting that the Shire has already received a small grant of \$7,500 from Horizon Power.

Funding for events and infrastructure for the Total Solar Eclipse have been made available to the Shire.

JTSI appointed event management contractors, Mellen Entertainment, will provide funding and resourcing support for community led initiatives. Officers are in the process of negotiating budget support and additional events for the Shire.

State preference is for infrastructure projects that leave a legacy for the community.

Given the requirement to have projects in place by April 2023 and current demand on the Shire Infrastructure team, projects which leverage of the existing program of works were considered. Improvements to Town Beach Playground and Café Precinct was prioritised. The proposed scope of works includes:

- Improving lighting
- Increasing shade (adding to already planned shade structure)
- Upgrades to ablutions
- Replace and reposition the swimming pontoon
- Installation of an Insta-worthy Carnarvon Banana, which will double as climbing frame
- Additional seating

Council agreed and authorised the CEO to negotiate and execute a funding agreement between the Shire of Carnarvon and the Department of Jobs, Tourism, Science, and Innovation for the Total Solar Eclipse event for Town Beach improvements, subject to the works being fully funded by the grant.

COUNCIL ADOPTS THE SHIRE OF CARNARVON 2020/2021 FINANCIAL REPORT, AUDITORS REPORT AND AUDITORS MANAGEMENT REPORT

Section 5.53 of the Local Government Act 1995 requires the preparation of an Annual Report and details the contents required within that report. Section 5.54 requires that the Annual Report for a financial year be accepted no later than 31 December after that financial year or within 2 months of receiving the auditor's report. In this instance, the finalization of the Annual Report has been delayed due to delays with finalising the financial statements and obtaining the Auditor's Report. This is due to several factors, including changes in key finance staff at the Shire and processes to changes to accounting standards.

The Local Government Act 1995 requires that an Electors' General Meeting is to be held within 56 days of acceptance of the Annual Report. Pending adoption of the Annual Report, the Electors' General Meeting will be scheduled for 12noon on Tuesday 8 November 2022, at the Shire of Carnarvon, Council Chambers.

It is a requirement (S7.12A of the Local Government Act 1995) of the that Local Government prepares a report on any matters identified as significant by the auditor in the audit report and submit the report to the Minister within three months of the audit report being received by the Local Government. The report is required to include an action plan to address these matters and must be published on the Shire's website.

Sections 5.53, and 5.27 of the Local Government Act 1995 provide the statutory framework for the Annual Report and Electors' General Meeting. While the Shire of Carnarvon has not met statutory timeframes in this matter, other aspects of the process are compliant with the requirements of the legislation.

Council accepted the Shire of Carnarvon Annual Report for the 2020/2021 Financial Year, incorporating the Shire President's Report, CEO's Report, Financial Statements and Auditors Report, and make the Annual Report publicly available via the Shire website, at the Shire Administration Centre and at the Carnarvon Regional Library.

The Annual Electors General Meeting has been set for Tuesday 8 November 2022 commencing at 12 noon in Council Chambers. Members of the public are invited to attend and to note that the meeting will also be live streamed through the Shire of Carnarvon facebook page.



COUNCIL APPOINTS BUSH FIRE CONTROL OFFICERS

The Bush Fires Act 1954 has a statutory requirement relevant to local government, requiring that the Shire maintains a register of persons appointed to fulfill the role of Fire Control Officer.

Several new appointments are recommended to provide sufficient local support to the brigade during the 2022/23 fire season. Training support is available to appointees through the Department of Fire and Emergency Services.

Employee movements in and out of the Shire, has necessitated the appointment of several Fire Control Officers (FCO) and a review of the FCO register.

Section 38 of the Bush Fires Act 1954 gives local governments the power to appoint Bush Fire Control Officers and the Act provides such persons with the necessary authority to perform their duties under the Act.

BLOWHOLES CAMPGROUND WORKS

The Shire of Carnarvon have engaged BTX Contracting to undertake works at the Blowholes camping area, to better delineate the existing camping sites at the popular destination.

This work, which will not change the number of sites for camping, aims to protect vegetation and dunes by preventing camping bays encroaching outside of each site.

The works will be completed in staged sections starting 9 November 2022. Work will be scheduled to minimise disruption to existing campers by working on smaller sections at a time which may be closed to the public only when required.

Appropriate barriers and signage will be in place to ensure the work site remains safe for workers, campers and day-visitors, and making sure the rest of the campgrounds are accessible while work is underway.

This project is funded by the federal Local Roads & Community Infrastructure Program, and aims to protect the existing landscape and clearly demarcate each of the camping bays. The number of camping sites is not changing, and the sites can be viewed on site plans.

NEW SHADE SAILS TO BE INSTALLED AT TOWN BEACH

In anticipation of the upcoming summer season, the Shire is installing 6 new shade sails over the playground area at Town Beach. The sails will provide children with a sun safe play space and will keep this popular play equipment cooler for use.

“We are excited to provide the children in our community an enhanced and safer play area in time for summer and holiday season with this much needed improvement” said Shire President Eddie Smith.

The new shade structures are expected to be complete in time for the summer school holidays in December. As well, the Shire has applied for additional funding and, if successful, will invest in additional shade to be installed over the kiosk area.



MAJOR WORKS IN PROGRESS FOR BASTON PAVILION

The Carnarvon community can expect to see major works in excess of \$150k being conducted at the Baston Pavilion on the Festival Grounds in the upcoming months. Works will include refurbishments to both the interior and exterior of the building, including new ceilings and floors, new plumbing and electrical fixtures, and fittings, as well as fresh paint on external elements.

These works were awarded by Council in June to local suppliers and contractors and will provide local sporting clubs with improved facilities to host events, games, and training while also providing the community with a modern and functional space.

The anticipated completion for the works is early December, in time for the summer season and holidays.





COUNCILLORS COMPLETE TRAINING

It is a prerequisite for all Councillors who have been newly elected to complete the Elected Member Training within 12 months of being elected. In recognition of the unique and challenging role that council members have, the training course, Council Member Essentials, has been developed to provide council members with the skills and knowledge to perform their role as leaders in their district.

Council's elections were held in October 2021 with 4 new Councillors having now completed the compulsory training which includes the following training modules -

- Understanding Local Government
- Serving on Council
- Meeting Procedures
- Conflicts of Interest
- Understanding of Financial Reports and Budgets

All Councillors continue to undertake training relevant to their role on a regular basis to ensure that they are kept up to date with relevant changes within Local Government and to build on their knowledge and skills required as a Councillor.

MODERN FLAG POLES TO BE ERECTED AT TOWN CENOTAPH

The current flag poles located at the Town Cenotaph are being replaced after an approach was made by the local RSL to have the existing flag poles replaced. The existing poles have been in existence for decades and were no longer fit for purpose. The flag poles will be in place in time for the Remembrance Day Service on 11 November.

Many community members have contributed towards this project and their generosity is acknowledged with the Shire contributing the shortfall in costs.

The new poles will enable the locking of the halyards internally within the poles which will prevent anyone from interfering with the flag poles when not in use.

A very big thank you to the contractors and staff who will be carrying out this work and getting the work done ready in time.

SNAKE!

IF YOU SEE A SNAKE

- Leave it alone. Snakes are generally shy and will not attack unless provoked.
- If you see a snake inside your home, get all people and pets out of the room immediately. Keep an eye on the snake from a safe distance and call a professional snake catcher. If you are not comfortable watching the snake, close the door, fill the gap underneath with a towel while waiting for a professional.
- If you see a snake outside, watch where it goes. If it's heading for the bush or an open paddock you probably won't see it again. If it disappears into a shed or under a vehicle, then you may need to call a snake catcher.


TIPS FOR AVOIDING A SNAKE BITE

- Never try to catch or kill a snake yourself. This is when most bites happen.
- Remember that even little snakes can be dangerous. Baby brown snakes have venom from the time they hatch.
- Stick to the trails in national parks and reserves and make a bit of noise when you walk.
- Keep your yard clear of long grass and rubbish so snakes have nowhere to hide.
- Rats and mice are a snake's smorgasbord, so clean up after the chooks and control rodents on your property.

IF YOU ARE BITTEN

Always assume the snake may be venomous. Symptoms may include nausea, sweating, diarrhoea, pains in the chest and double vision.

- Apply direct pressure to the bite site with a broad bandage or improvise with clothing or the flat of your hand.
- Call an ambulance or get to a hospital as soon as possible.
- Sit quietly, as this will reduce the speed that the venom can move around your body.
- If you have a first aid kit, wrap a compression bandage tightly around the bitten limb, starting just above the fingers or toes and moving upwards on the bitten limb as far as can be reached
- Remember what the snake looked like or take a photo so the doctor can identify it.
- Do not attempt to take a live snake with you.



SNAKE BITE TREATMENT

In 4 quick steps

- 1** Place wound dressing on bite site.
Immediately apply a firm pressure bandage over the bite site. Do not wash venom off the skin as it will assist in later identification.
Bandage over the wound and bandage up the limb covering the entire limb and then back down towards the extremity.
Use the Pen provided to mark the bite puncture marks on the outside of the bandage.
- 2** Bandage should be firm. Keep the body and limb as still as possible. Do not elevate the limb.
Immobilise the limb as best possible, if the bite is on the forearm, put the splinted arm in a sling.
Reassure the patient and keep them calm. Many snakes are quite harmless.
- 3** **SEEK URGENT MEDICAL ASSISTANCE**
WARNING you must not walk the patient, remove the bandage or apply a tourniquet.
CHECK CIRCULATION AT REGULAR INTERVALS.
- 4**



REMEMBER

Snakes are protected native animals and it is illegal to kill them unless there is a direct threat to human life. Snakes have an important place in our ecosystem, especially in controlling rats and mice. Snakes are not aggressive animals, they are purely defensive animals. If you corner or try to capture them, they can't kick or punch, there is only one thing they can do and it's bite you.



It seems the community is growing unnecessarily frustrated regarding unanswered phone calls placed directly to the Carnarvon Police Station...either after 4pm on weekdays, and/or over the weekend.

The Police Station is opened from 8am to 4 pm, Monday to Friday. This means that during this time, there are either Police staff or Police officers in the office, whose tasks include, but are not limited to, responding to Community member complaints in person or over the phone.

Past 4.00pm, on weekdays and over the weekend, the officers on duty are mainly tasked to respond to incidents, and be as proactive as possible to reduce Crime.

Fortunately for all of us, those officers are not able to stay in the office, sit and wait for the phone to ring...

Therefore, if you happen to need Police and call Carnarvon Police Station (9941 7333) after 4.00pm week days and/or weekends, your calls will simply be re-directed to the Mid-West Gascoyne District Office (which happens to be located in Geraldton). The Police Station there is opened 24 hours, everyday.

The process is exactly the same though: your calls are answered and your complaints are recorded on the WA Police system, which is common to the whole State.

The District Office then dispatch on-duty Police officers attached to Carnarvon PS who will respond to all incidents by way of urgency.

Alternatively, you can call 131444 to report NON-Emergencies, and 000 otherwise.

I hope this helps you all better understand how the resources are managed, and it helps in reducing unnecessary frustrations and negative comments.

Midwest Gascoyne Major Projects 2022

The Gascoyne Development Commission (GDC) were proud to be a partner for the 2022 Midwest Gascoyne Major Project Forum held in Geraldton.

The event attracted over 200 stakeholders including senior industry, investors, businesses, community, and government representatives.

The forum was held over 2 days, with topics covering decarbonisation, transforming and growing horticulture, facilitating tourism growth, and the 2023 Total Solar Eclipse. Discussions were also held regarding the housing crisis in our region and how it is impacting regional growth, opportunities for revitalisation, potential solutions and how they can be achieved.

The Forum highlighted the importance of working together to achieve growth for the region, including ensuring Aboriginal economic development opportunities. GDC were proud to be able to support some of our Traditional Owners in attending, with "supporting Aboriginal people in mainstream business" a strategic priority of ours.



Construction begins on Coral Bay worker accommodation

The GDC were very excited to welcome Minister MacTiernan to Coral Bay last week, where she visited the site where work has commenced on new workforce accommodation.

The project will see 42 units built, providing housing for up to 60 people to help address critical workforce accommodation shortages in the town.



The project supports the broader redevelopment of RAC's Ningaloo Reef Resort, which involves replacing the ageing beachfront facility with 90-room accommodation, parking, amenities and a club house.

The worker's accommodation is a result of many years of close collaboration between the Baiyungu community and RAC and occurs on land majority-owned by Baiyungu Aboriginal Corporation (BAC).



ABOUT THE REGIONAL AIRFARE ZONE CAP

The Regional Airfare Zone Cap is a partnership between the State Government and the airline industry. It allows WA regional residents access to capped airfares for personal travel on eligible routes to and from Perth, subject to seat availability. The State Government has committed funding of up to \$19.8 million over three years to 2025 to five airlines operating on eligible regional air routes.

ELIGIBILITY

Zone Cap fares are **only for regional residents of WA**, living outside of the Perth and Peel regions. Zone Cap fares must be booked as a return fare that departs and returns to the same regional destination.

New Fire Danger Rating

Launching on
1 September 2022

From September 1st, the Fire Danger Rating System will be reduced to four levels -

- Moderate,
- High,
- Extreme, and
- Catastrophic.

You will see the new system in action across the country - this means that whether you are at home or on the road, you will be able to recognise the same rating system.

The new fire danger rating system is designed to deliver more precise and timely information by utilising the latest science and community input.

There will be actions for each level, so you know what to do to protect your life, family and property. For more information on the ratings and messages, please see below

Supporting messages, including localised information, will clearly explain what community response is required at each level.

The AFDRS also introduces an 'off' or 'no rating' level (white strip under Moderate) for days where no proactive action is required. This does not mean that fires cannot happen, but that they are not likely to move or act in a threatening way.

MODERATE Plan and prepare	HIGH Be ready to act
EXTREME Take action now to protect life and property	CATASTROPHIC For your survival, leave bushfire risk areas

Name/Colour	Fire Behaviour Index Range	Suppression difficulty
MODERATE (Green)	12-23	Most bushfires in this category. Fires typically suppressed with direct, parallel or indirect attack.
HIGH (Yellow)	24-49	Initial attack success critical to prevent large fire development. Defensive suppression strategies.
EXTREME (Orange)	50-99	Defensive suppression strategies. High levels of threat to life/property. Safety of firefighters and community paramount.
CATASTROPHIC (Red)	100+	Unsafe for firefighters and community. Without initial attack success, likelihood of very large fire development is very high. High probability of loss of life and property.





