Local Government Reform

Voting in the October 2023 Local Government Elections

The State Government is putting into action the most significant reforms to the local government sector in 25 years. The reforms will increase the transparency, accountability and efficiency of local government in WA.

One of the key reforms is the change from 'first past the post' system of voting to optional preferential voting (OPV).

This change will be introduced for the October 2023 local government elections which will now be in line with state and federal elections.

OPV will strengthen democracy by giving ratepayers a greater choice of candidates.

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TIP AMNESTY EXTENSION REQUEST APPROVED

Council has approved a request from a horticulturalist to have the tip fee amnesty extended due to delays in appropriate asbestos disposal.

The applicant wrote to the Shire expressing his gratitude for the tip fee amnesty initiative but advising that due to the need to obtain certain licences, approvals and permits to remove hazardous materials, he may be unable to complete the desired clean up of legacy waste from the two North River Road properties before the amnesty expires on 8 September 2023.

The applicant sought an extension of the amnesty for disposal of specific waste types only, being asbestos, conduit tubing and concrete drainage to complete the clean up of both properties.

Under the new Fees and Charges for 2023/24 the fee for depositing more than 10kg of asbestos waste at the Browns Range landfill site is \$103 per tonne with a minimum charge of one tonne. An additional burial fee of \$75 per load applies. The estimated amount of asbestos proposed to be delivered to the landfill site is 58 cubic metres or 0.754 tonnes (~ ¾ tonne). This equates to a loss of revenue to the Shire of \$103 plus a burial fee of \$75 for each load of asbestos delivered.

Within two weeks of the commencement of the amnesty the applicant had engaged a contractor to safely remove old and disused hazardous materials on the two properties. However, the need to obtain licences, approvals and permits delayed the contractor from commencing the clean up within the amnesty timeframe.

The contractor has estimated the volume of asbestos to be removed to the Brown's Range landfill site to be 58 cubic metres. He has indicated that up to three months may be required to complete the work due to sourcing a suitably sized asbestos vacuum. Once the asbestos vacuum arrives he plans to start the clean up works immediately and has delayed other longer term contracts to ensure he is available to complete the work.

Given that the removal of asbestos and other waste from the horticultural district is the desired outcome of the amnesty initiative, Council agreed to the amnesty extension for a further 3-months for the applicant, to complete the clean up of both properties.

HARBOUR ROAD AND CORNISH STREET ASPHALTING CONTRACT AWARDED

In July, a Request for Quotation (RFQ) process was initiated seeking to engage an asphalt sealing contractor for the overlay of two intersections within the Shire. The works comprise of a tie-in and overlay of the existing sealed surface with asphalt to the following –

- · Intersection of Harbour Rd and Cornish St and
- Intersection of Harbour Rd and the Road Train Assembly Area (RTAA)

The Shire procured the services of Greenfield Technical Services (Greenfields) to assist with the quotation process. The RFQ document was prepared by Greenfields and distributed by email to five suitable contractors on the WALGA Preferred Supplier Panel.

The works proposed under the RFQ were originally included as provisional items in RFT 07/2021 for the construction of Harbour Road which was completed in 2022. However, asphalt intersection works were removed due to budget constraints at the time.

The less durable sprayed bitumen on these intersections have not withstood the demand on the surface giving rise for reassessment of the type of sealed surface. This is particularly apparent at the road train assembly area. Regular maintenance of the seal in that area was required over the previous summer period.

The Harbour Road/Cornish Street intersection seal has performed better due to less heavy vehicle traffic volumes. Construction defects in the form of rutting were however noted at that intersection after completion of the Harbour Road construction contract during the contract defect liability period. Those defects are required to be rectified by the original construction contractor. Asphalt to correct that rutting is considered the most appropriate solution to address that rutting. The construction contractor has agreed that the defects be rectified under RFQ 11/2023.

Work outlined in the RFQ is required to:

- a) Rectify construction defects identified at the intersection of Harbour Road and Cornish Street, and
- b) Improve seal durability at the intersections of Harbour Road and the Road Train Assembly area and Harbour Road and Cornish Street.

Council awarded the contract to Fulton Hogan who have had many years experience working in the road construction industry.



GOLDEN CROWNBEARD - WEED

Please be advised it has been discovered that several instances of the Golden Crownbeard Weed has been identified in and around Carnaryon.

This is an aggressive weed that displaces native vegetation and is toxic to stock and other animals.

We are currently in peak flowering and seeding season. So it is important to stop any further spread of this weed.

The Shire is currently actively removing the Golden Crownbeard from known public property.

As a community, we need your help, to work together to keep our biodiversity and nature-scapes, pest free.

We need your help!

If this weed is found on your property please see the below best practices to help stop the spread throughout our community.







Best Practice:

Pull weed from ground ensuring its roots are intact and removed from the soil.

Collect weed, roots and seeds in a garbage bag and ensure that its fully sealed. It can either be disposed in general waste or, we also encourage drying and burning the weed in a small personal fire.

This art work portrays an Aboriginal meeting place with the community represented by the multi-cultural shades of each person sitting at the meeting circle.


The Shire, Wider Community and our 3 talented artists are so excited to see this mural come to life.

SNAKE!

IF YOU SEE A SNAKE

- Leave it alone. Snakes are generally shy and will not attack unless provoked.
- If you see a snake inside your home, get all people and pets out of the room immediately. Keep an eye on the snake from
 a safe distance and call a professional snake catcher. If you are not comfortable watching the snake, close the door, fill the
 gap underneath with a towel while waiting for a professional.
- If you see a snake outside, watch where it goes. If it's heading for the bush or an open paddock you probably won't see it
 again. If it disappears into a shed or under a vehicle, then you may need to call a snake catcher.

TIPS FOR AVOIDING A SNAKE BITE

- · Never try to catch or kill a snake yourself. This is when most bites happen.
- · Remember that even little snakes can be dangerous. Baby brown snakes have venom from the time they hatch.
- . Stick to the trails in national parks and reserves and make a bit of noise when you walk.
- . Keep your yard clear of long grass and rubbish so snakes have nowhere to hide.
- Rats and mice are a snake's smorgasbord, so clean up after the chooks and control rodents on your property.

IF YOU ARE BITTEN

Always assume the snake may be venomous. Symptoms may include nausea, sweating, diarrhoea, pains in the chest and double vision.

- Apply direct pressure to the bite site with a broad bandage or improvise with clothing or the flat of your band
- Call an ambulance or get to a hospital as soon as possible.
- Sit quietly, as this will reduce the speed that the venom can move around your body.
- If you have a first aid kit, wrap a compression bandage tightly around the bitten limb, starting just above the fingers or toes and moving upwards on the bitten limb as far as can be reached
- Remember what the snake looked like or take a photo so the doctor can identify it.
- Do not attempt to take a live snake with you.



NEED A RANGER

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
REMEMBER

If you corner or try to capture them, they can't kick or punch, there is only one thing they can do and it's bite you.



SUCCESSFUL CLEAN UP EFFORT AT ONE TREE POINT IN PREPARATION FOR WORLD CLEAN UP DAY

In a remarkable display of community engagement and environmental stewardship, a partnership of organisations including the Department of Water and Environmental Regulation, Keep Australia Beautiful, Shire of Carnarvon, Mungullah Community Aboriginal Corporation, Real Futures, and MKB Industries joined hands for the clean-up at One Tree Point. This initiative, which took place on Thursday, 14 September, was a prelude to the upcoming World Clean-Up Day on Saturday, 16 September.

The collaborative effort yielded an astonishing result with more than nine trailer loads, equating to 2.4 tonne of rubbish removed from the One Tree Point reserve. This cleanup operation serves as a testament to the power of collective action and a shared commitment to preserving our natural environment.

The Shire of Carnarvon extends its gratitude to all participating agencies and individuals who dedicated their time and energy to make this event a resounding success. By doing so, they have not only demonstrated the tangible outcomes of the Strategic Community Plan but have also underscored the Shire's unwavering commitment to safeguarding the local environment.

Among the many objectives achieved through this clean-up effort, a primary focus was placed on raising awareness about the detrimental effects of illegal dumping within our community. The competition is divided into two categories, poetry and prose and students are eligible to enter both categories

Millie attends the Carnarvon Christian School and was invited to write a short story at the last minute. It paid off and her wonderful story can be read on the following page. Millie was one of 71 winners out of 545 submissions - a great achievement by any standards.

Who is Randolph Stow

Randolph Stow, in full Julian Randolph Stow, (born November 28, 1935, <u>Geraldton</u>, <u>Western Australia</u>, Australia—died May 29, 2010, <u>Harwich</u>, <u>Essex</u>, England), Australian novelist and poet noted for his economical style and great powers of description.

Stow's first <u>novel</u>, A Haunted Land (1956), a wild, almost Gothic tale, appeared in the same year that he graduated from the University of Western Australia. In 1957 he began to teach English at the University of Adelaide and brought out his second novel, The Bystander, a further <u>treatment</u> of the themes of A Haunted Land. He later worked in an Anglican mission for <u>Aborigines</u> in northwest <u>Australia</u>, assisted an anthropologist in <u>New Guinea</u>, and traveled to <u>England</u>, Scotland, and Malta. In 1962 and again in 1968 he taught at the University of Leeds, England, and in 1963 he taught at the University of Western Australia.

A new standard has been introduced across Australia to improve food safety. If your food business is captured under the standard, you will need to comply with the requirements by 8 December 2023.

Why is there a new standard?

Poor food handling can cause outbreaks of foodborne illnesses, which can result in avoidable hospitalisations, loss of revenue and reputational damage to food businesses. This new standard has been introduced to reduce foodborne illness by ensuring food is handled safely by food handlers with adequate skills and knowledge.

Will my business be impacted by the standard?

You will need to comply if your business handles:

- unpackaged
- potentially hazardous
- ready-to-eat foods.

Two categories of businesses will be impacted.







Category one

Your business will be classified as category one if it processes or makes unpackaged, potentially hazardous, ready-to-eat foods. For example, cafés, restaurants or caterers that cook and serve meals with foods such as meat, dairy, seafood, cut fruit and vegetables, pasta and rice.

Category two

Your business will be classified as category two if it only minimally handles unpackaged, potentially hazardous food (such as slicing, weighing, repacking, reheating or hot-holding). For example, a service station which receives chilled pies and sandwiches that are displayed in a hot or cold display unit, or a supermarket deli which slices and packs cold meats.





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Food safety management tools

The standard introduces 3 tools to manage food safety.

1. Food handler training

Food handlers (including chefs, cooks, waiters) in category one and two businesses will need to complete food handler training or show that they have the necessary skills and knowledge in food safety. Details of free online food handler training courses can be accessed at www.health.wa.gov.au/FSMT. Alternatively, each food handler can demonstrate skills and knowledge of food safety and hygiene matters.

2. Food safety supervisor

Category one and two businesses will need to appoint at least one food safety supervisor who must be reasonably available to advise and supervise the food handlers when they are handling unpackaged, potentially hazardous, ready-to-eat foods.

A food safety supervisor will be required to take a training course delivered by a registered training organisation and the certification must be refreshed every 5 years. Courses are listed at: www.health.wa.gov.au/FSS

3. Showing that food is safe

Category one businesses must show that food safety controls are being managed by keeping records of it. The records must be kept for a minimum of 3 months.

Key records you may need to keep include:

- temperature of food on receival and transport
- storage and display temperatures
- cooking temperatures, or other pathogen control steps
- time taken to cool or reheat foods
- cleaning and sanitising of equipment and premises.

Record templates can be downloaded from www.health.wa.gov.au/FSMT

Alternatively, you can use other ways to demonstrate that you are managing key food safety controls. This can be checked by your local government *Food Act 2008* authorised officer.







Alerts

Incidents or issues on the road affecting access or safety. These include closures or changes due to flooding crashes, breakdowns, bushfires and alike.



Road closures

Information about road closures due to incidents or major planned roadworks. Road closures are shown as red lines on the map.



Roads open to specified vehicle types

Roads may only be open to certain types of vehicles. Full closure details including the vehicles able to access the road are provided in the alert.



Roads open with caution

Some roads may remain open however caution may be required to ensure the safety of all. For example, this includes tog incidents or minor flooding.



Traffic signal outages

We provide the location of those traffic lights that are blocked out to help you plan a safer trip.



Detours

information is provided for you to safely navigate around an incident or issue on the road.



Roadworks

information about current or planned roadworks having the potential to cause delays to your trip.



Events

information about events having the potential to cause road closures or increased congestion in an area.



Rest areas and amenities

The location and details of places to stop during your trip are provided to help ensure a safer journey. Stopping places include parking, toilets and even picnic areas.

Powered by Google, this filter shows congestion across WA roads.

Minister Punch announces Round 6 Regional Economic Grant Recipients in Shark Bay

The GDC were pleased to welcome Minister Don Punch, Minister for Regional Development, Disability Services, Fisheries, Seniors and Ageing and Volunteering to Denham on 27 September to announce the round six Regional Economic Development (RED) Grant recipients.

The Regional Economic Development Grants program is a State Government initiative investing \$50.85 million over nine years (2018-19 to 2026-27) in local projects to stimulate economic growth and development in regional Western Australia.

The GDC have been proud to support local organisations and businesses in the Gascoyne as they have delivered 32 RED grant projects totaling \$3, 590, 122 in State Government funding to date.

Round 6 was another popular RED Grant Round with 20 applications and five successful recipients.



The Shire of Shark Bay will receive \$250, 000 to assist in the construction of five new 3x2 houses in Denham, housing up to 10 essential workers and their families. Two of the houses will be allocated to the shire for essential worker accommodation, with the remaining three houses set to be leased on a long-term basis by the Department of Communities as Government Regional Officers' Housing (GROH).

The Birdcage Hair Exmouth will receive \$180,000

funding to expand their business by refurbishing a building

within Exmouth's commercial precinct, transforming it into the town's largest holistic hair and beauty salon. Once complete, the salon will have the capacity to employ an extra 4 full-time staff.

Gascoyne Plumbing Solutions will receive \$103, 090.91 to purchase and customise a trailer with wastewater and freshwater tanks. This will make Gascoyne Plumbing Solutions the only company that can transport potable water in the region. Once complete, this will allow the company to create another 4 full-time jobs.

ABC Foundation will receive \$10, 000 in funding. The project will purchase a custom-made cage trailer that will transport intermediate bulk containers (IBCs) and wheelie bins, to facilitate collection of cans and bottles to and from sites and events across the Gascoyne region, to the ABC's processing facility in Carnarvon.

Exmouth Dental Pty Ltd will receive \$5,000 funding which will allow the clinic to purchase sedation equipment for the delivery of Nitrous oxide (happy gas) to anxious dental patients, that alternatively may need to travel to Perth for anesthesia.






