INDIGENOUS LAND USE AGREEMENT (ILUA) - CORAL BAY WASTE FACILITY

Following the Ordinary Council Meeting in May 2024 a formal compensation offer was provided to NTGAC for their consideration

This offer was developed with the aim of progressing economic, social, cultural, and environmental outcomes.

The NTGAC Board considered the offer and in summary, the NTGAC has agreed to some components of the offer, proposed a counteroffer for the financial compensation and included two items not previously part of the compensation offer.

Council resolved to formally offer a compensation package to Nganhurra Thanardi Garrbu Aboriginal Corporation (NTGAC) for an Indigenous Land Use Agreement (ILUA) on the terms set out to allow the Shire to construct a new waste disposal facility on a portion of Lot 304, Coral Bay.

CEO RECRUITMENT IN COMPLIANCE WITH THE ACT AND REGULATIONS

Council is required to provide confirmation that the recruitment process for employing the new Chief Executive Officer has been completed and undertaken in accordance with the Shire's adopted standards for CEO Recruitment, Performance and Termination.

At the Special Council meeting on the 7 May 2024, Council endorsed the CEO recruitment process and other associated matters .

Council received the CEO Selection Panel's confidential Chief Executive Officer Recruitment Report at the Special Council meeting on the 16 July 2024 and authorised the Shire President to execute an employment contract.

The Shire's employment offer was accepted by the preferred applicant for the Chief Executive Officer role, Amanda Dexter, on 16 July 2024.

Council certified that the CEO recruitment process completed on execution of the CEO employment contract dated 16 July 2024 and approved by Council was conducted in accordance with the Shire of Carnarvon adopted standards for CEO recruitment.



2024/2025 BUDGET ADOPTED

Council is required to prepare and adopt an annual budget for each financial year, not later than 31 August Ordinary of each financial year, or such extended time as the Minister allows. The legislation prescribes the form and content of the Annual Budget, which must include Statement of Comprehensive Income, Statement of Cash Flow and Statement of Financial Activity (formerly known as the Rates Setting Statement – RSS) and various other notes.

The purpose of levying rates is to meet Council's budget requirements in each financial year to deliver services and community infrastructure. The rates levied are determined by applying the rate in the dollar to the applicable valuation amount of the properties. The Minister for The Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries (the Minister) determines the methods of land valuation, with the actual valuation provided by the Valuer General's Office (VGO). Local Governments that apply differential rates must advertise their intention to impose differential rates, consider any public submissions and then apply to the Minister for approval to impose differential rates. The application must take into consideration section 6.33 of the Act, which provides the ability to differentially rate properties based on zoning or land use as determined by the local government.

The Statement of Financial Activity (SOFA) represents a composite view showing source and application of the finances of the Shire of Carnarvon. Calculations for the 2024/2025 SOFA identified the need to raise \$6.99 million in rates revenue, which equates to a 4.5% increase in rates revenue and growth in rates for 2024/2025. The rates revenue generated will allow the Shire to continue with running its operations and delivering capital projects with the Shire's financial constraints

PLANT REPLACEMENT PROGRAM ENDORSED

Local governments are required to produce a plan for the future under S5.56 of the Local Government Act 1995. By regulation, that plan must include a Strategic Community Plan and a Corporate Business Plan.

As part of this integrated planning and reporting framework process, a Plant Replacement Program (PRP) has been prepared to guide replacement of plant and vehicle assets over the next ten years. The PRP is an informing document to the Long Term Financial Plan and Corporate Business Plan.

CIVIC CENTRE UPGRADES TENDER NOT ACCEPTED

In October 2023 the Shire received funding from Department of Fire and Emergency Services (DFES) as part of the Local Government Resilience Fund. With this fund DFES supports 16 Local Governments impacted by Cyclone Seroja to undertake works to improve resilience of evacuation facilities.

The funding is for upgrades to the woolshed which serves as an evacuation centre. The improvements include roofing of the outdoor courtyard, enhancements to the kitchen facilities and interior renovations. On 17 July 2024 the Shire advertised RFT 05/2024 Civic Centre Upgrades (Design and Construction).

The evaluation panel recommended that no tender be received for the works and that the CEO be authorised to revise the project scope of works. There was only one tender received and it was felt that more tender submissions would be likely if the Shire an provide designs including engineering approvals. Other cost savings were identified including a reduction in roof structure size.

Council were in agreeance to the panel recommendations and tenders will be readvertised for the revised Civic Centre Upgrades project scope.



COUNCIL ACCEPTS FUNDING FROM DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORT FOR AIRPORT UPGRADES

In September 2023, the Shire of Carnarvon approved a pavement concession for REX to operate the Dash Q400 aircraft into Carnarvon Airport. The pavement concession for REX expires in October 2024. An extension of this concession will be required to enable REX to continue to operate into Carnarvon Airport until upgrades are completed.

Prior to approving the concession, a pavement inspection was completed by Regional Airport Management Services (RAMS) who was engaged by the Department at their cost.

Subsequent pavement inspections by RAMS were agreed to be conducted at three monthly intervals upon commencement of the Q400 operation to monitor impacts to the pavement. The most recent Pavement Inspection was completed in July 2024. No material defects have been identified to date.

RAMS identified the recommended works and project budget required for upgrades to allow unrestricted operation of Q400 aircraft. An estimated budget of \$8 Million was identified for the recommended works.

In May 2024 the Shire received correspondence from the Minister for Transport to advise that as part of the 2024-2025 Budget, the State Government endorsed a grant to enable up to \$8 million of upgrades to Carnarvon Airport pavements to a condition suitable for unrestricted Q400 operations.

The first step of the project is engagement of a suitably qualified and experienced Project Manager. The Project Manager will assist the Shire with the following:

- Preparation of the scope of works and terms of reference for engagement of the Independent Technical Expert required under the funding agreement;
- Preparation of the necessary designs, technica specifications, and tender documentation;
- Provision of technical advice to prospective tenderers and be a member of the tender submission Evaluation Panel;
- Act as contract Superintendent during construction works to ensure all works are completed to the required standard:
- Work collaboratively with the independent Technical Expert to ensure milestone claim information is provided to the Department to ensure timely funding payment.

CARNARVON HERITAGE GROUP REQUEST TO CONTRIBUTE TOWARDS CLEANING COSTS OF PUBLIC TOILETS DENIED

The Shire received a request from the Chairperson of the CHG seeking Council consideration to contribute toward the cost of cleaning toilets located within the Carnarvon Heritage Precinct building.

The toilets are cleaned by a contractor twice weekly at a cost of \$200 per week. The CHG currently shares this cost with the tenants of the Kestrel Café as they occupy part of the complex and their patrons use the facility. The toilets are accessible by the public during the hours of 8am to 4pm from Tuesday to Sunday.

The CHG has requested the Shire to contribute one third of the weekly cleaning cost of the toilets, being \$66.67 per week. If Council were to approve the request, the Shire cash contribution will equate to be \$3,466.67 per annum. There is no current budget allocation for this expenditure.

In prior years, the Shire applied a rates donation of up to 90% to the rates account for the CHG properties. During financial years 2002/2003 to 2021/2022, the CHG received a total value of \$21,228.52 in rates donations for the heritage precinct property.

Consideration of this request as a stand-alone item is not a preferred process for considering distribution of Shire funding to community groups and clubs. Extensive review of the Community Growth Fund policy and process has been undertaken in recent years to provide a standardised, transparent determination process for community groups and clubs.

To not circumvent the existing Community Growth Fund process provided under Council policy and to avoid setting a precedent, it is recommended Council do not grant the CHG request and advise the CHG committee to apply for financial assistance through the Community Growth Fund.

The CHG were encouraged to apply through the Community Growth Fund to seek funding toward the cost of cleaning the public toilets located at the Carnarvon Heritage Precinct.

AMENDMENT TO LOCAL PLANNING SCHEME NO.13 GIVEN THE GREEN LIGHT

The proposed amendment aims to facilitate the implementation of the HyEnergy Renewable Green Hydrogen Project, known as the 'HyEnergy Project.

Council previously considered this item at the Ordinary Council Meeting on 23 January 2024 and decided to initiate the scheme amendment. However, following referral to the Environmental Protection Authority (EPA) for assessment, EPA responded with further information to make modifications to the scheme text.

In detail, the proposed changes to LPS 13 include:

- rezoning the western section of Lot 350 in the Town Common area from 'Environmental Conservation' reserve to 'Strategic Infrastructure' reserve and 'General Industry' zone:
- introducing a Special Control Area (SCA) in Schedule 7 to incorporate additional provisions for the proposed 'General Industry' zone;
- adding Additional Use Areas under Schedule 1 to allow for extra land uses within the existing 'Environmental Conservation' reserve; including Additional Use Areas under Schedule 2 to permit additional land uses within the planned 'General Industry' zone; and
- updating the scheme maps to reflect the changes in rezoning, SCA, and additional use areas.

The scheme amendment proposal, once initiated, will be forwarded to the Environmental Protection Authority (EPA) in accordance with s. 81 of the Planning and Development Act 2005. The application is then required to be advertised for a period of 60 days.

Initiating the Scheme Amendment with the modified text will provide a level of certainty to the proponents that the project can eventuate in the future. Many of the details (such as environmental impact, costings, detailed designs etc.) will be completed at a later stage once a level of certainty is provided.

Council agreed to the rezoning of the western portion of Lot 350 from 'environmental conservation' to 'strategic infrastructure' and 'general industry' zone.

REGIONAL ROAD GROUP FUTURE YEAR WORK PROGRAMS

The approved RRG project works for 2024/2025 is as follows:

- 1. Quobba Gnaraloo Road, SLK 62 -71 reshape formation and drainage to achieve consistent Type 3 standard and resheet to achieve 7m pavements.
- 2. Minilya Lyndon Road, SLK 107-116 reshape formation and drainage to achieve consistent Type 3 standard and resheet to achieve 7m pavements.

Goodwork Holdings Pty Ltd has been awarded contract RFT 02/2024 Supply of Plant and Operators for Unsealed Road Upgrade Works for the delivery of the RRG project program for a period of three years, commencing in 2024/2025.

Works will commence on Minilya/Lyndon Road in early 2025. Works on Quobba/Gnaraloo Road will follow and is planned for completion by May/June 2025. The intent is to then continue works on Quobba/Gnaraloo under the 2025/2026 program to avoid additional mobilisation/ demobilisation.

Since 2023/2024 the Shire has nominated two projects per year for the RRG program to maximise value for money and economy of scale.

The three-year program adopted by Council in 2022 focused on the three major unsealed roads in the Shire network i.e. Quobba Gnaraloo Road, Minilya Lyndon Road and Wahroonga Pimbee Road.

That program included a Quobba Gnaraloo Road Project for each year with alternating resheeting and reconstruction projects for Minilya Lyndon and Wahroonga Pimbee Roads for the other RRG project.

The proposed program for years 2025/2026 - 2027/2028 maintains this approach as can be seen in the program to the right.

The development need on each of the unsealed roads as identified in the Roads 2040 strategy is to upgrade each to consistent type 3 standards. Type 3 standard is defined as "Road construction from imported material of adequate thickness, shaped and drained."

FASCINE WALL CAPPING BEAM REPLACEMENT WORKS

The Shire of Carnarvon wishes to advise residents and visitors that its contractor First Class Construction (WA) will commence works replacing the Fascine Wall Capping beam sections this week. Contract works is expected to be completed by 31 October 2024.

The capping beam is the 650mm wide section of concrete on the lower footpath area closest to the water edge.

Work will commence at the Baxter Park end of the Fascine and progress north. Work will be completed in sections. This will require sections of the lower footpath to be closed to pedestrians while capping beam replacement works is in progress. Short term closures of the upper fascine wall footpath may also be required. Barrier fencing will be installed around works areas. Please follow all signage and keep clear of work areas.

This project is funded by the Local Roads and Community Infrastructure (LRCI) program, through the Federal Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development, Communications and the Arts.

We will continue to keep the community informed as these works progress. We appreciate your understanding and cooperation and apologise for any inconvenience.

COUNCIL TAKES ACTION ON ILLEGAL SHACK

The Shire of Carnarvon is taking decisive steps to protect the natural beauty and integrity of Blowholes Reserve. Recently, a new shack was constructed within the reserve without the necessary approvals, which is a clear violation of our planning and building regulations. This unauthorised structure goes against the Shire's Local Planning Scheme and the State Administrative Tribunal's recent ruling on developments within the reserve.

The Shire has reached out to the shack owner, informing them of the breaches and requesting the immediate removal of the structure. However, if the shack isn't removed within 14 days, the Shire will step in to have it demolished. The costs for this action may be recovered from the person who built the shack.

Allowing unauthorised structures could harm the environment, disrupt local wildlife, and undermine public confidence in our ability to enforce regulations. The Shire is committed to upholding the rules that protect our precious natural areas, ensuring they remain pristine for everyone to enjoy.

We will continue to monitor the situation and take the necessary actions to maintain the integrity of Blowholes Reserve.

RESPONSIBLE DOG AND CAT OWNERSHIP

The Shire of Carnarvon encourages responsible pet ownership and enforces cat and dog ownership guidelines as stated in the Dog Act 1976, Dog Regulations 2013, Shire of Carnarvon Dogs Local Law 2021, Cat Act 2011 and the Shire of Carnarvon Cats Local Law 2021.

Rangers may impose on-the-spot fines and impound dogs for breaches of the Dog and Cat Acts. As of 1 November 2013, all domestic cats in Western Australia, over six months of age, need to be sterilised, micro-chipped and registered with their local government as per the Cat Act 2011.

Dogs are also required to be microchipped and registered with their local government as per the Dog Amendment Bill 2013. We encourage all dog owners to sterilise their pets to prevent them from contributing to the increasing population of unwanted animals. Pet owners have specific legal responsibilities, which are intended for the convenience of all the community, as well as the health and well-being of your animals.

DOG OWNERSHIP

You must ensure your dog is:

- currently registered (if over three months of age)
- micro-chipped
- wears a collar displaying name, address, phone number and registration tag.
- confined to the premises at which it lives or is temporarily residing.
- under the control of a competent person.
- only exercised off the leash in a designated area and is under verbal control. You must carry a leash.
- control, trained and restrained to prevent wandering, excessive barking, aggression and attacks of other animals or people.

LIMITATION OF DOG NUMBERS

- The limit on the number of dogs which may be kept on any premises is 2, for the purpose of Section 26(4) of the Dog Act. No exemption shall be granted to the owner or occupier of any premises if the premises by reason of inadequate fencing, size, location or detrimental effect on any other premises, would be inappropriate for the housing of three to six dogs.
- Upon request the Local Government may grant an exemption in relation to any particular premises under Section 26(3) of the Act, to house three to six dogs at one property.
- Request for exemptions can only be approved by delegated authority.
- Fee: \$150 per application

CAT OWNERSHIP

- Cat Act 2011 Cat Act 2011 [00-c0-01]
- All cats must be microchipped, registered and sterilised.

Hire of cat traps may be available for the capture of nuisance and or feral cats.

All dogs are to on a lead in public, unless in a prescribed dog exercise area. The owner should always have control of the dog and make every effort to keep the dog within a gated yard. A dog should never roam streets unattended. Only 2 dogs per property without a permit to house 3 or more...



What is the registration cost?

Lifetime \$250 3 yrs \$120 1 yr \$50 Sterilized: Lifetime \$100 3yrs \$42.50 1yr \$20 Pension: 50% less of Sterilized or Unsterilized.

Infringements may be applied with dogs picked up by the Ranger. Pound fees are, \$70 plus \$25 sustenance each day in the pound.





ThothX has embarked on a transformative journey to repurpose the former OTC antenna into a state-of-the-art Space Domain Awareness sensor. Starting on October 10, 2022, over five years, they aim to turn this historic dish into a crucial tool for observing, tracking, and measuring satellites in geostationary orbit.

This initiative is a key part of ThothX's global network, joining our sites in Canada and Portugal, to enhance space situational awareness. With their proprietary Earthfence software, they're enabling repurposed C-band antennas to function as Space Domain Awareness sensors covering the critical geostationary orbit belt. This is vital as geostationary orbit satellites, essential for global communications and economic activities, face increasing risks from space debris and other challenges.

Strategically located in Carnarvon, this refurbished antenna will offer unique advantages for deep space surveillance over the Pacific region, crucial for international economies and security. The project kicked off with thorough assessments in 2023, revealing the antenna's potential despite decades of neglect and damage.

Key refurbishment tasks include debris removal, rust remediation, optical component repair, and installation of RF receivers. They are addressing complex logistical and technical requirements, aiming for phased implementation and eventual commercial operations between 2025-2027.

Funding comes from ThothX subsidiaries in Canada and the USA, Australian federal grants, and venture capital discussions. This support ensures the comprehensive refurbishment and operational setup of the Carnarvon antenna, reinforcing its role in our global Space Domain Awareness network.

I refer to the appointment of Justin Walsh, Adam Nikitins and I as joint and several administrators of Rex at 9.30pm on 30 July 2024.

I am also pleased to be able to share with you that the <u>Federal Government has introduced a Regional Flight Booking Guarantee</u>, which will give Australians added confidence to continue booking to or from a regional destination on Rex.

The Regional Flight Booking Guarantee will ensure that in the unlikely event a customer's service is subsequently cancelled and not rescheduled, and no alternative service has been delivered to the customer, and the Rex Companies are unable to provide a refund, that the Federal Government will provide a guarantee over any chargebacks and refunds.

This is a good thing because it provides an added layer of security for customers to keep flying Rex.

Who will buy Rex?

We have received interest from a significant volume of parties interested in the Rex regional airline. This interest is encouraging as we work toward securing a long-term future for Rex as a regional airline.





CARNARVON CENTRAL MERITAGE WALK GUIDE

Kuwinywardu, Yinggarda Country was first settled by Europeans in 1876 This walk trail will take you through the heritage of central business area.

24°52'02"S 113°39'40"E Carnarvon:



Carnarvon's traditional owners are the Yinggarda people, who named this area long ago, Kuwinywardu (Gwoonwardu), meaning 'neck of water. The first European settlement was established in 1876 setting up the pastoral station known as "Brickhouse Station".

By 1881 there were several pastoral stations set up, including the well-known Brown Range station and the Brockman Station,which led to the region being declared a municipality. Gascoyne Roads Board was set up in 1882. Later to become the Lower Gascoyne Roads Board. The Shire of Carnarvon was established in 1965 with CW Tuckey elected as the first Shire President on the 1st March 1965.
