G'day Carnarvon

Our new Shire CEO Amanda Dexter arrived in Carnarvon and commenced work on Tuesday 22 October. Amanda has hit the ground running and has brought a strong sense of purpose and energy into the CEO position. Council is looking forward to working with Amanda to provide our community with the best possible municipal services we can provide.

On another note, Council at the October 22nd Ordinary Council meeting endorsed the position of requesting that the Minister for Lands, by formal order, revokes the Shire Management Order over the Blowholes Reserve 37457. This is due to the Shire of Carnarvon being unable, despite its best efforts, to achieve compliance with the Blowholes Reserve Management Plan (BRMP) 2014 – 2036 due to intractability of issues.

Council also endorsed ceasing the provision of all camping services and fee collection as of the 30th of November 2024. Appropriate signage will be installed advising that the area is no longer a serviced recreational area, as is much of our coastline. I trust all visitors will treat the area with respect.

It was difficult making this decision but given the length of time in years our Shire Council has endeavored to comply with the BRMP and Management Orders, which I can assure at times was quite discouraging. Council has concluded that the landowners, "The State" need to take a far more proactive role in the implementation of the BRMP.

To put it in very simple terms, Council has been placed in the middle in what is effectively a disagreement between the landowners and the squatters on that land.

I truly hope that all of our community and visitors continue to enjoy and respect the Blowholes area and importantly look after it, leaving only your footprints.

COUNCIL SUPPORTS WA LOCAL GOVERNMENT ASSOCIATION'S ADVOCACY POSITION ON LOCAL GOVERNMENT ELECTIONS

All Local Governments are being asked to provide a Council decision on WALGAs advocacy positions as they relate to Local Government Elections, to see if the positions are still current. The Local Government Amendment Act 2023 introduced a range of electoral reforms that came into effect prior to the 2023 Local Government ordinary elections:

- the introduction of Optional Preferential Voting (OPV);
- extending the election period to account for delays in postal services;
- changes to the publication of information about candidates;
- backfilling provisions for extraordinary vacancies after the 2023 election;
- public election of the Mayor or President for larger Local Governments;
- abolishing wards for smaller Local Governments; and
- aligning the size of councils with the size of populations of each Local Government (change to representation)

Following requests from several Zone's, WALGA undertook a comprehensive review and analysis of 5 ordinary election cycles up to and including the 2023 Local Government election against the backdrop of these legislative reforms. The review and report focused on postal elections conducted exclusively by the Western Australian Electoral Commission (WAEC), with the analysis finding evidence of the rising cost and a reduction in service of conducting Local Government elections in Western Australia.

Council confirmed their position in regard to the local government elections and recommended the following -

- 1. **Participation** The sector continues to support voluntary voting at local government elections.
- 2. Terms of Office The sector continues to support four year terms with a two year spill.
- 3. **Voting Methods** -The sector supports First Past the Post (FPTP) as the preferred voting method for general elections. If Optional Preferential Voting (OPV) remains as the primary method of voting, the sector supports the removal of the 'proportional' part of the voting method for general elections.
- 4. Internal Elections The sector supports First Past the Post (FPTP) as the preferred voting method for all internal elections
- 5. Voting Accessibility The sector supports the option to hold general elections through Electronic voting.
- 6. **Method of Election of Mayor** The sector supports as per the current legislation with no change Class 1 and 2 local governments directly elect the Mayor or President (election by electors method), with regulations preventing a change in this method.

APPOINTMENT OF AUTHORISED PERSONS UNDER THE BUSH FIRES ACT 1954

It is a statutory requirement under the Bush Fires Act 1954 for Local Governments to maintain a current register of persons appointed to fulfill the role of Fire Control Officer. The Shire's register requires updating. Employee movements in and out of the Shire has necessitated the appointment of several Fire Control Officers (FCO) and a review of the FCO register.

SHIRE OF CARNARVON TO REQUEST THAT THE MINISTER REVOKE THE SHIRE MANAGEMENT ORDER OVER THE BLOWHOLES RESERVE

The Shire has been dealing with issues relating to management of the Blowholes Reserve for many years. The recent State Administrative Tribunal (SAT) decision has made management of the reserve increasingly difficult.

The Shire of Carnarvon manages the Blowholes Reserves. This consists of a Crown Reserve (previously four reserves) which are under a Management Order to the Shire. Under the Management Order, the Shire is responsible for day-to-day management of the Reserves. Records show that from as early as 1985, the Shire has been concerned with the Shacks on the Reserves. A Standing Committee Inquiry into shack sites in Western Australia (2011) reported that, in 1985, the Shire moved to remove the Shacks on or before 30 June 1988. The Shacks were not removed.

In 1992, the Council again resolved that all shacks be removed to create a designated passive recreation, overnight camping and foreshore protection reserve. Since that time, other Council resolutions have alternatively sought the removal of the shacks and had such decisions revoked. This pattern has continued until the present day, including in September 2019 when Council resolved to direct the CEO to carry out the demolition of 14 dangerous shacks in default of building orders issued by the Shire, with the remaining shacks to be removed by June 2020. Council revoked that resolution in November 2019.

More recently, following an appeal lodged with SAT by the Blowholes Protection Association after building orders were served on the shack occupiers in May 2022, SAT determined to permit several shacks to remain on the reserve and allowing others to be made not dangerous. This decision is contrary to the Blowholes Reserve Management Plan and further complicates management of the reserve. Following the outcome of the SAT hearing, Council resolved to write to the Minister for Lands requesting financial, technical and practical assistance in this matter. Correspondence noted should the Minister not provide that support, the Shire will divest itself of the Blowholes Reserve, as it is unable to fulfill the obligations under the Blowholes Reserve Management Plan (BRMP). No support was offered after the request and subsequently, the Shire advised the Minister for Lands in writing that it will divest itself of the Blowholes Reserve.

The following issues have proven to make management of the reserve near impossible and inhibit the Shire from fully implementing and complying with the BRMP.

- Existence of the shacks in the current location;
- SAT's determination allowing shacks to remain on the land and be repaired;
- Lack in the Shire financial capacity to prepare environmental studies and cultural heritage assessments to implement the BRMP;
- Lack of staff resources to implement the BRMP; and
- Continued demand for infrastructure improvements and maintenance services with limited available budget.

Noting the above and the time, effort and money spent trying to implement the BRMP, limited community benefit has been able to be delivered. Council resolved that as it is unable, despite its best efforts, to achieve compliance with the Blowholes Reserve Management Plan (BRMP) due to intractability of issues, that the Minister be requested to formally order to revoke the Shire management order over Blowholes Reserve 37457. Further, that -

- Council will support the President and Chief Executive Officer in ongoing efforts to lobby the State Government to negotiate a viable path forward for the management of the Blowholes Reserve with a commitment to fulfilling the original intent of the Blowholes Reserve Management Plan 2014- 2036, which sought to 'manage the reserve in a more strategic, coordinated, equitable and sustainable matter,' while acknowledging that government recreational reserves are established for the benefit of the public and community purposes.
- cease provision of all camping/caravan area management services, all toilet facilities and services, all caravan dump point facilities and services and all rubbish facilities and services at the Blowholes Reserve effective from 30 November 2024;
- suspend the collection of Blowholes campground fees effective from 30 November 2024;
- issue formal Public Notice of the changes in management and the cessation of all municipal services at the Blowholes Reserve effective from 30 November 2024; and
- Install appropriate signage at the Blowholes Reserve advising that the area is no longer a serviced recreational camping area.

MEMORIAL PLAQUE TO BE INSTALLED AT FASCINE PARK AREA IN MEMORY OF ALAN CARROLL WHO WAS A PREVIOUS CLERK OF COURTS

Council received an application for a replacement plaque acknowledging Alan Carroll's contribution as a Clerk of Courts from 1970 – 1977 at the Carnarvon Courthouse. The plaque and installation costs to be borne by the applicant.

The applicant advised that Mr Carroll was buried in the Memorial Garden at the old Courthouse. His remains were later interred at Cuballing Cemetery to be closer to his wife who had relocated to Cuballing.

Information received from the community indicates that a memorial plaque was installed at the Courthouse site after the relocation of Mr Carroll's remains. It is not known what happened to this original plaque during the demolition of the old Courthouse site.

Council's policy states that all applications must meet the following requirements -

- Commitment to fund the requested memorial item (plaque, memorial, monument, or tree),
- Must bear a relationship with the open space setting proposed and be consistent with any approved masterplans for the site,
- Must not detract from the aesthetic value of the identified location.

Recent discussion with community members who knew Alan has revealed that support was given for Mr Carroll's interment at the old Courthouse. This action indicates he was held in high regard by the community and his colleagues through his work as Clerk of Courts. On this basis, Council agreed to the installation of a memorial plaque on the Fascine to commemorate Mr Carroll's tenure as a Clerk of Courts.

This recognition highlights the vital role that supportive employers and self-employed volunteers play in the State's emergency service efforts, where over 95% of personnel are volunteers.

The Volunteer Employer Recognition Awards celebrate employers who enable their staff to respond to emergency incidents and participate in essential training by offering flexibility and support. Many self-employed volunteers also sacrifice their business operations during emergencies, often at a personal financial cost, to assist their communities in times of need.

The Shire of Carnarvon was recognised for fostering a workplace environment that actively supports volunteer participation in emergency services. By offering flexible work arrangements and reducing the financial burden on employees, the Shire demonstrates its commitment to empowering its staff to serve the community.

"We are proud to support our employees who volunteer for emergency services," said Shire's Acting CEO John Attwood. "At the Shire of Carnarvon, we understand the challenges small communities face in attracting and retaining volunteers. That's why we developed our Paid Volunteer Emergency Service Leave program in 2022 to encourage greater participation and make volunteering more accessible."

A Growing Commitment to Volunteering

Before 2022, Shire employees were able to volunteer but often had to use their leave or take leave without pay, which created a financial strain. To address this, the Shire introduced the Paid Volunteer Emergency Service Leave program, which provides employees with dedicated leave for volunteering. This initiative has seen employee participation in emergency services rise dramatically - from just 5% in 2021 to approximately 35% in 2024.

The program allows staff to be on-call during work hours, attend vital training sessions, and respond to emergency incidents, ensuring they can support organisations such as St John Ambulance, SES, Carnarvon Bush Fire Brigade, Carnarvon Volunteer Firefighters, and Carnarvon Volunteer Marine Rescue. Additionally, employees can take time off to recover from night callouts without compromising their regular leave entitlements.

"By offering Paid Volunteer Emergency Service Leave, we've not only increased volunteer numbers but also reduced the financial impact on employees. This helps sustain our local emergency services and ensures our community is protected when it matters most," John Attwood stated.

Looking Ahead

The Shire of Carnarvon remains committed to promoting community integration and volunteerism. The Paid Volunteer Emergency Service Leave program is regularly advertised in the Shire's weekly newsletter Team Tales and is featured as an employee benefit in recruitment efforts, further encouraging participation in vital local volunteer groups.

The Shire of Carnarvon's recognition at the 2024 Volunteer Employer Recognition Awards stands as a testament to its dedication to community support, volunteerism, and the safety of Western Australia.

SHIRE OF CARNARVON CONGRATULATES LOCAL BUSINESSES ON REGIONAL ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT GRANT SUCCESS

The Shire of Carnarvon congratulates the local businesses that have been awarded funding under Round 7 of the Regional Economic Development (RED) Grants. These grants, totaling \$1.2 million, are set to enhance the region's economic growth and community development.

Carnarvon made up a significant portion of these successful projects, including:

- Wooramel Pastoral Company: Awarded \$181,000 to develop the Birdrong Mineral Pool and Wellness Oasis at Wooramel River Retreat, creating a new wellness experience for visitors.
- Warroora Station: Awarded \$181,000 for the construction of Warroora Café, Meeting Hub, and Amenity Building to expand agri-tourism offerings and accommodate large events in the region.
- Coral Coast Dental: Awarded \$159,000 to expand dental services in Carnarvon, with plans to attract two new dentists to the area.
- Gascoyne Food Council: Awarded \$80,000 to develop cold chain innovation, enhancing the shelf life, quality, and marketability of Carnarvon's renowned produce.
- ThothX Australia: Awarded \$50,000 for the restoration of the OTC Dish in Carnarvon, further preserving the region's rich space history.

Since its inception, the RED Grants program has delivered nearly \$4 million across 35 locally-driven projects in the Gascoyne, supporting innovation, infrastructure, and growth for our community.

Shire President Eddie Smith praised the businesses and thanked the Gascoyne Development Commission and the State Government for their continued efforts.

"These successful projects demonstrate the strength and innovation within our local business community. The support from the RED Grants program, combined with the hard work of these businesses, is creating real opportunities for economic development in Carnarvon."



PETS IN VEHICLES

Did you know that every year, hundreds of pets die from heat exhaustion because they are left in parked vehicles. There are many excuses as to why animals are left in cars from "Oh, it will just be a few minutes while I go into the shop" or "but I wound down the windows enough so that fresh air could get into the vehicle".

Data attained by local Australian motoring clubs shows that the ambient temperature inside a sealed car on a sunny 20-degree Celsius day can double in less than ten minutes, and rise to as much as 60 degrees C within 30 minutes. If the temperatures are hotter, then the interior temperatures rise accordingly. Even on a sunny 15-degree C day, internal temperatures can reach dangerous levels. Even night temperatures can be too much if it's a hot night.As well, studies have shown that even cracking the windows open to cool the car is essentially ineffective, as temperatures will still quickly rise to 80 per cent of the maximum potential top temp.

Please be diligent and before putting your pet in the vehicle ask yourself if you really need to take your pet with you - and if the answer is no leave your pet safely at home out of the heat.



Speak to your neighbour or leave a note. They may not know their dog is a nuisance. If the barking continues, you can contact the Rangers. It can take some time to stop the barking, but if it continues, bark diaries may need to be completed to give a better indication of

the problem times. If the matter is not resolved, diaries will need to be completed by three people from two different properties and the matter may be taken to court.

All unclaimed rehomable dogs that have been impounded are assessed and rehomed through SAFE Carnarvon. They are always looking for foster carers as their resources are limited. If you would like more information, please contact SAFE on 0448 569 563.

SAFE (Saving Animals From Euthanasia)

Their mission is to save companion animals from unnecessary euthanasia through community education, fostering, de-sexing and placing them in suitable homes. SAFE has set up a network of temporary carers who open their homes to abandoned animals whilst permanent homes are sought. SAFE is proactive in helping to bring about positive change in the areas which cause so many unwanted, abandoned and neglected animals, and strongly supports and promotes desexing. Through positive change, the primary goal for SAFE is to make a difference in the quality of life for companion animals and to promote their immense value to humans.





They shall grow not old as we that are left grow old: Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning We will remember them.






IN MEMORY OF THE HMAS SYDNEY AND THOSE WHO SERVED ON HER



CYCLONE - BE PREPARED!

- On average five cyclones occur off Western Australia's (WA) north-west coast each year, of these, two directly impact the coast and affect local communities. In Western Australia (WA) cyclone season starts in November and continues through to April. During this time coastal regions of WA are at risk of being impacted by cyclones.
- Preparing your family and your property for a cyclone is your responsibility, this includes being familiar with the meanings of cyclone alerts and warnings. People also need to take proper precautions and responsibility for their own welfare, prepare property inside and out and develop a cyclone plan to ensure their safety.
- Planning before the cyclone season can help save lives, minimise property damage and help your family to cope during a cyclone.
- Experiencing a cyclone can be frightening and traumatic. After a cyclone, many essential services may not be working, roads may be closed, food and water could be in short supply and your property or livelihood could be damaged.
- The strong winds produced by a cyclone (up to 280 kilometres per hour) can cause injury, loss of life, major structural damage to communities, disruption of utility and telecommunication services, and turn debris into dangerous missiles.
- Cyclone activity produces strong onshore winds and flooding rains increasing the threat of storm surge. This is a rapid rise in sea level that accompanies a cyclone as it moves ashore.
- People can drown or be fatally injured during or after a cyclone by collapsing buildings and moving debris during severe winds.
- Having an emergency kit is an important step to prepare and protect your household for unforeseen events and is essential for short term survival providing vital items for you, your family or household. It is a good idea to always keep your kit in a handy place known to everyone in the household.
- Cyclone Olwyn was the most significant cyclone to affect the Gascoyne coast in decades. Olwyn impacted Carnarvon on the 13th March 2015, causing minor to moderate damage to homes and infrastructure, significant damage to the power network, disruptions to water supply and significant damages to plantations and cropping.



UNDERSTANDING THE NEW WARNING SYSTEM FOR NATURAL DISASTERS

There are three warning levels which move up and down to reflect the risk to your life or property before, during and after a natural disaster. These are the same warning levels used for bushfires. The warning level will be followed by an action such as "Monitor Conditions" or "Shelter Indoors Now" giving you clear information about how to stay safe. Learning these three levels and how to respond to them could save your life.


SPEEDING SHAFTERS OUR EXCUSES

While speed remains the leading illegal behaviour causing death and serious injury on our roads, concerningly 87% of drivers admit to speeding and 51% consider speeding to be ok.

'Speeding shatters your excuses' challenges the common excuses of speeding, aiming to instil attitude and behaviour change. The campaign relays the message that nothing ever makes it okay to speed, it's just not worth the risk.

Even when it seems okay to speed a little... Even when it seems everyone else around you is speeding... Even if you know the road like the back of your hand... Even when you're running late...

Nothing ever makes it okay to speed. If speed is a factor in your crash, there is no excuse for the harm you've caused. Speeding shatters your excuses.









From 25 November, which is the International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women, to 10 December, Human Rights Day, individuals and communities across Western Australia have an opportunity to show their support for ending violence against women, including family, domestic and sexual violence through 16 Days in WA – Stop Violence Against Women (16 Days in WA).

The campaign draws inspiration from the 16 Days of Activism Against Gender-Based Violence, an international initiative to end violence against women and girls across the world.

In Western Australia, 16 Days in WA aims to raise awareness, motivate positive action and highlight organisations, agencies, communities and individuals taking action to end violence against women.

The campaign is a State Government initiative which began in 2017. Key messages

- Violence against anyone is unacceptable.
- We all have a responsibility to stop family and domestic violence.
- Stopping family and domestic violence means promoting gender equality and respectful relationships.
- Play your part to help keep your family and community safe.





- Family violence continues to be a driver of gender inequality, including in the areas of employment, participation and financial security.
- Family and domestic violence is also the leading cause of homelessness for women and children and a significant factor impacting health, inclusion and participation for people with disability.
- Family and domestic violence is experienced at disproportionately high rates by Aboriginal and culturally and linguistically diverse women and children, people with disability and people who identify as LGBTIQ+.
- Coercive control is family and domestic violence. Coercive control is a pattern of abusive behaviour, not just a single behaviour or incident.
- Technology-facilitated abuse is a form of domestic, family and sexual violence in which perpetrators control, stalk and harass their victims using digital technology.
- National survey results highlight that work on awareness, understanding and attitudes regarding violence against women and gender inequality needs to continue in WA.
- There are still concerning proportions of people whose attitudes undermine women's leadership, reinforce rigid gender roles, limit women's personal autonomy, normalise sexism and deny gender inequality is a problem.

LOOK OUT!

I am sure that many people have come across people riding their bikes and skateboards on the footpaths in the main street and have had to step out of the way to avoid a collision.

Council are aware of the issue and the apparent disregard by these particular users of the footpath. Pedestrians, mobility scooters and wheelchairs have right of way on Council paths The riding of bikes, skateboard, roller blading and scooter riding on the Robinson Street Footpaths between the first roundabout and the last roundabout is illegal. If you are caught riding on the footpaths, a \$25 fine will be imposed.

FINES - Riding a bicycle on other than dual use footpath(\$25); Riding a bicycle on other than a left hand side of a footpath (\$25); Riding a bicycle on a footpath at a speed in excess of 15km/hr (\$25)

PROTECT YOURSELF FROM MOSQUITOES

There is no cure or vaccine to protect against mosquito borne diseases acquired in Australia. The only way to prevent infection is to avoid being bitten. This can be done by -

- Covering up and wearing long, loose fitting, light coloured clothing, covering as much body as you can.
- When outdoors and mosquitoes are present, apply insect repellent containing DEET (diethyltoluamide) or picaridin evenly to exposed skin.
- Clean up making simple changes around your home can reduce mosquito breeding. Remove, empty or cover water-holding containers.



RULES FOR E-RIDEABLES IN WA

With the use of eRideables in WA continuing to rise, we want to make sure the State's road rules reflect the new technology and keep all Western Australians safe.

As of 4 December 2023, new laws were introduced on the use of eRideables - which include e-scooters, electric unicycles, electric skateboards, electric roller-skates, onewheel electric scooters and hoverboards.

These laws bring our State into line with other jurisdictions. These laws for riders include:

- Maximum speeds of 25km/h on bike paths and local roads, and 10km/h on footpaths and pedestrian areas
- Requirement to give way to pedestrians and keep to the left of oncoming riders
- 16 year age minimum
- Use of helmets, lights and reflectors
- The same mobile phone and drink and drug driving rules as for motor vehicle drivers



Carnarvon's traditional owners are the Yinggarda people, who named this area long ago, Kuwinywardu (Gwoonwardu), meaning 'neck of water'. The first European settlement was established in 1876 setting up the pastoral station known as "Brickhouse Station". By 1881 there were several pastoral stations set up, including the well-known Brown Range station and the Brockman Station, which led to the region being declared a municipality. Gascoyne Roads Board was set up in 1882. Later to become the Lower Gascoyne Roads Board. The Shire of Carnarvon was established in 1965 with CW Tuckey elected as the first Shire President on the 1st March 1965.
