## SHIRE OF CARNARVON DECLARES VOTE OF NO CONFIDENCE IN GOVERNMENT RESPONSE TO VULNERABLE CHILDREN

The Shire of Carnarvon has formally declared a Vote of No Confidence in the State and Federal Governments' handling of vulnerable children, both in Carnarvon and across regional Australia.

While the community faces significant challenges, Carnarvon is not in crisis—it is taking action. The Shire's Vote of No Confidence is not about blame; it is a call for urgent investment and real solutions to support young people and break the cycles of harm and disadvantage.

Shire President Eddie Smith said the failure to implement key recommendations from major inquiries and Royal Commissions has left too many children at risk.

"We need immediate investment in intervention programs, crisis accommodation, and long-term social infrastructure to ensure a safer future for our children," said Mr Smith. "Governments must work with local communities, frontline services, and Aboriginal organisations to deliver meaningful change."

The Shire of Carnarvon is calling on all levels of government to respond immediately with a comprehensive action plan that prioritises:

- A Regional Youth Crisis Response Taskforce bringing together local government, Aboriginal organisations, law enforcement, and community leaders to coordinate urgent action.
- Increased investment in early intervention, community-led diversion programs, and frontline youth services to keep children out of the criminal justice system.
- Immediate funding for social housing and crisis accommodation in regional WA, ensuring vulnerable families and children are not left on the streets.
- A transparent accountability framework, requiring regular reporting on progress in tackling this issue.

Until these actions are taken, the Shire of Carnarvon stands firm in its Vote of No Confidence in the State and Federal Governments.

Deputy Shire President Cr Burke Maslen reinforced the community's commitment to securing a better future for local youth.

"Carnarvon is a strong, resilient community that deeply cares about its young people," said Cr Maslen. "This is about ensuring every child has access to the support and services they need. With the right investment, we know they can thrive."

The Shire of Carnarvon is committed to working alongside government and stakeholders to drive real and lasting change. The time for action is now.

## CARNARVON: ONE STEP CLOSER TO EXCITING WATERFRONT DEVELOPMENT



The Shire of Carnarvon has approved a revised planning application by DG Corp, paving the way for an exciting waterfront development at the Fascine. The decision, made at a Special Council Meeting today, marks a significant milestone in a project that has been 15 years in the making.

The development will transform the prime waterfront site into a vibrant, mixed-use precinct featuring 56 accommodation units, catering to both short and long-term stays. The project also includes an iconic waterfront bistro and provisions for commercial spaces along Robinson Street, enhancing the town's economic and tourism potential.

The architectural design has been refined to complement the existing town centre, ensuring a seamless streetscape while improving the Olivia Terrace and Robinson Street frontage.

Shire President Eddie Smith welcomed the development, highlighting its potential to address critical housing shortages for essential workers, including those in the health and police sectors.

"The Shire has been working for over 15 years to secure the right development for this site, and we are thrilled to see this project progressing. It will provide much-needed housing solutions and contribute to the long-term growth of Carnarvon," he said.

DG Corp Principal Nick De Latte reaffirmed the company's commitment to delivering the project efficiently.

"Subject to the necessary approvals, we are eager to commence construction and aim to complete the development within 12 months," he stated.

Councillor Dudley Maslen, former Shire President, moved the motion in support of the development, noting its transformational impact on Carnarvon's economy and urban landscape.

"A project of this scale has been a long time coming. This development will stimulate further investment and growth, benefiting both residents and businesses," he said.

The approval marks a significant step towards revitalising Carnarvon's waterfront and unlocking new opportunities for the town's future.



## TEMPORARY CLOSURE OF ROBINSON STREET CORAL BAY JANUARY TO APRIL 2025

The Shire of Carnarvon wishes to advise the community and visitors that a section of Robinson Street in Coral Bay will be temporarily closed to all traffic from 13 January 2025 to 5 April 2025 to facilitate reconstruction works associated as part of the RAC Ningaloo Reef Resort redevelopment.

This exciting redevelopment, led by RAC, includes enhancements to the public road and adjacent facilities, ensuring long-term benefits for both pedestrians and vehicles in Coral Bay.

## Key Information:

## Scope of Works

- Installation of a towing vehicle turnaround area at the end of Robinson Street,
- New asphalt surfacing for road and parking areas,
- Construction of new kerbing, drainage, footpaths, pedestrian crossings
- Additional vehicle parking.

## Road Closure

- The affected section of Robinson Street will be closed to all vehicles.
- Road Users are advised to follow signage and traffic controller directions.

### Beach Access

• Pedestrian access to the beach will remain open two existing beach access paths.

### Timeline

• Work will commence on 13 January and be completed by 5 April 2025 in time for the Easter 2025 school holidays.

While the Shire recognises the potential inconvenience this temporary closure may cause, these works are critical to delivering enhanced vehicle and pedestrian facilities that will benefit Coral Bay for years to come.

## PIONEER CEMETERY FENCING PROGRESS REPORT

The Shire of Carnarvon has recently sought community feedback on plans to install security fencing at the Pioneer Cemetery to protect this significant heritage site and its infrastructure. The feedback from the community will be taken into consideration when finalising the layout of the fencing plan.

The project involves the installation of Garrison-style security fencing around the cemetery perimeter, with designated entry and exit points.

Future security upgrades will include electronic time-locked gates to manage access more effectively.

Installation is scheduled to commence in May 2025, following the delivery of materials.

This fencing project marks the first stage of a broader initiative to preserve and enhance the cemetery. Future works will be undertaken in collaboration with the Friends of the Pioneer Cemetery and families with loved ones resting at the site.

The Shire acknowledges the dedication of community members who have advocated for the reinstatement of the fence and the strong community support for this project and look forward to working together on the next stages as we secure further funding.






## STAGES 4 AND 5 OF THE NORTHWATER STRUCTURE PLAN ENDORSED BY COUNCIL

Council has endorsed the structure plan at its Council Meeting held on Tuesday 25 February 2025.

Stages 1 and 2 of Northwater Estate relates to the residential and canal development that has since been developed to the south-east of the structure plan area.

Stage 3 relates to an area of the parent lot that was granted subdivision approval in May 2023 for new residential lots.

The Northwater Structure Plan (Stages 4 and 5) is the last piece to the puzzle and a critical planning document guiding the future land use and development within the last two stage of the Northwater Estate. The structure plan is proposed to provide a road connection from Babbage Island Road at its northern extent through to Parnaa View at its southern extent.



## THEM CONTRACTING AWARDED TENDER FOR FLOOD DAMAGE ROAD REPAIRS

The Shire of Carnarvon suffered damage to various road assets following Ex-Tropical cyclone Lincoln and associated flooding between 19 and 25 February 2024. Reinstatement cost of these roads qualifies for Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements – Western Australia (DRFA-WA) to repair the damage to pre-weather event conditions.

A Tender process was undertaken seeking a suitable contractor for the provision of plant and operators for the repair of the damaged roads with Council awarding the contract to THEM Earthmoving Pty Ltd for the repairs.

## TRAMWAY BRIDGE REFURBISHMENT: MOVING FORWARD WITH THE REPLACEMENT OPTION IN STAGES

The refurbishment of the Tramway Bridge is a vital project that will ensure the long-term safety and functionality of this essential infrastructure. After careful consideration, the Council has reviewed two design options – repair and replacement – and has recommended moving forward with the replacement option.

This preferred design methodology will provide a modernised structure with improved safety, durability, and efficiency, ensuring that the bridge continues to serve our community for years to come.

## **Stage 1: The Critical Phase**

The refurbishment project will be completed in stages, with Stage 1 identified as the most critical and complex phase due to its location on the bridge. This stage involves significant work over the water, requiring specialized equipment and careful coordination to minimize disruption.

In contrast, Stages 2 and 3 are land-based tasks, making them more straightforward in terms of accessibility. The land-based work, such as driving piles and replacing components, benefits from the ease of access for both personnel and plant equipment, significantly reducing complexity and improving efficiency.

With Stage 1 being the most complex and requiring precise planning, the Council is committed to ensuring that every aspect of the replacement is handled with the utmost care and attention to detail. The replacement option offers the greatest benefits for long-term sustainability, and the proposed methodology ensures that the project will be completed efficiently and safely.

## PELICAN POINT DUNES REMAIN CLOSED TO VEHICLES

The Shire of Carnarvon has extended vehicle access restrictions at Pelican Point Beach to support ongoing dune stabilisation and vegetation recovery efforts.

Initially implemented in November 2023, these measures have shown promising signs of environmental restoration. However, additional time is required to ensure the success of these initiatives.

The community's cooperation has been instrumental in protecting this valuable coastal area. The Shire plans to conduct another review in 12 months to assess progress.

Previously, in January 2023, the Shire restricted vehicle access to Pelican Point Beach to protect vegetation and potential turtle nesting sites.

The Shire appreciates the community's continued support in preserving this important natural asset.

## SHIRE OF CARNARVON ENDORSES DESIGNS FOR THREE KEY ACTIVATION PROJECTS

At the Special Council Meeting held on Friday 28 February, the Shire of Carnarvon formally endorsed the detailed designs for three key projects as part of the Carnarvon Activation Plan – Phase 1. The projects are being delivered through \$3.3 million in funding from Lotterywest, following extensive community consultation that began in June 2023.

Shire President Eddie Smith highlighted the importance of these projects, stating, "The community played a key role in shaping the Carnarvon Activation Plan, and today's endorsement means we are another step closer to bringing these projects to life. We look forward to delivering vibrant and engaging spaces that will benefit locals and visitors alike."

## The Three Endorsed Projects Tramway Walk Trail

- Installation of trail furniture and signage to enhance the popular Tramway Walk Trail.
- Encourages active living and storytelling through historical and cultural interpretation.

## Van Dongen Park Redevelopment

- New playground, landscaping, and improved dayuse facilities.
- Designed as a family-friendly space for recreation and relaxation.

## **Connect and Create**

·Public Art - Local artists will contribute installations for the Main Street and Van Dongen Park, celebrating Carnarvon's culture.

·Digital Screen - A large display outside the Civic Centre will showcase community artwork, event promotions, and local storytelling.

## **Commitment to the Tramway**

The endorsement of the Tramway Walk Trail marks an important step forward for the community, particularly considering discussions around the Tramway Bridge.

"The Tramway is an important piece of Carnarvon's history, and Council remains committed to its repair," said Cr Smith. "At the same Special Council Meeting, Council also made a decision on a way forward with the Tramway Bridge repair options. It's important that we continue with both the Walk Trail and Bridge repairs concurrently to ensure the best outcomes for our community and visitors."

## **Change in Project Scope**

A variation request to Lotterywest was approved to reallocate funding originally intended for the Community Stage at Town Oval. The funding has now been directed towards the existing project elements, providing an additional budget for construction to ensure the successful delivery of these key projects.

"While the Community Stage remains a priority for Council, we need to ensure it is delivered in the best way possible," said President Smith. "The current budget does not allow us to build a stage that meets community expectations, but we will continue working with Lotterywest and other funding bodies to seek opportunities to make it a reality in the future."

In addition to the endorsed designs, two other activation projects are still undergoing further community consultation:

- Tramway Shelter
- Healing Shelter at the Lock Hospital Memorial Statue

These projects are being refined to ensure their final designs align with the community's vision. Once consultation is complete, they will be presented to Council for endorsement at a future meeting.

## **Council Commitment to Community Activation**

Speaking to the motion, Cr Luke Vandeleur addressed concerns about the allocation of funding, stating, "The funding has been offered to Council for the specific purpose of activation from Lotterywest, not for fixing roads as an example. For anyone feeling against the funding being spent, that wasn't the choice Council had today – we are accepting projects that align with Lotterywest's funding criteria, and the priorities identified through community consultation."

## Next Steps: Opportunities for Local Businesses

With the detailed designs now endorsed, the next stage will be the development of tender documents to progress these projects towards construction.

Shire President Smith encouraged local businesses to keep an eye out for upcoming opportunities, stating, "This is an exciting time for Carnarvon, and we encourage local businesses to be ready to participate in the tender process. These projects are significant for the town, and we hope to see local contractors and suppliers play a key role in bringing them to life."

## RANGER NEWS

## LITTER AND THE LAW

Litter is any refuse or general waste that is discarded in an open or public place. Litter can detract from the aesthetics of an area and, depending on the nature and circumstance of the litter, can cause personal injury and/or environmental damage. Illegal dumping includes rubbish dumped at the side of a road, or items left on a verge outside of collection times.

There are many forms of littering and the Shire's Ranger Service will investigate each report. To ensure everyone continues to enjoy our shire, we've placed litter bins on streets and parks throughout the area.

Litter can include: Any material that is thrown or allowed to fall or is blown from a vehicle; the placing of waste in a reserve or public place the placing of domestic waste in a public rubbish bin the placing of bulk waste on your verge before the due date dumping of unwanted household, commercial or industrial waste in an open or public place throwing cigarette butts on the ground

Littering is an offence under the Litter Act 1979. Did you know littering carries a fine of up to \$63,000 for individuals and \$125,000 for corporations?

The Litter Act 1979 outlines what litter is and what constitutes littering. Littering offences are investigated and actioned by either the Rangers, Police officers or from the Keep Australia Beautiful Council. Illegal dumping is now covered in the Environmental Protection Act.

## **ILLEGAL DUMPING**

Illegal dumping is a particular type of littering where people go out of their way to dump their rubbish. It includes waste materials that have been dumped, tipped or otherwise deposited onto land. Illegal dumping varies from small bags of rubbish in an urban environment to larger scale dumping of waste materials in isolated areas, such as bushland.

Report illegal dumping in Carnarvon to the Shire of Carnarvon Rangers on 99410000 during office hours.

People who witness illegal dumping should if possible, and without placing themselves at risk, take note of the following:

- date, time and place the offence was committed
- description of the offender.
- Vehicle make, model, colour and registration
- type of litter or nature of the illegal dumping

Illegal dumping can be prosecuted under the Environmental Protection Act 1986 with maximum fines of \$62,500 for individuals and \$125,000 for corporate bodies (businesses). Under the Litter Act 1979 minor illegal dumping can attract an infringement notice of \$500 or \$2,000 if taken to court.

Photographic or video evidence will also assist Rangers follow up with any prosecutions that may result from the information.
















## UNDERNEATH/ OVERLOOKED

## **CYCLONE - BE PREPARED!**

- On average five cyclones occur off Western Australia's (WA) northwest coast each year, of these, two directly impact the coast and affect local communities. In Western Australia (WA) cyclone season starts in November and continues through to April. During this time coastal regions of WA are at risk of being impacted by cyclones.
- Preparing your family and your property for a cyclone is your responsibility, this includes being familiar with the meanings of cyclone alerts and warnings. People also need to take proper precautions and responsibility for their own welfare, prepare property inside and out and develop a cyclone plan to ensure their safety.
- Planning before the cyclone season can help save lives, minimise property damage and help your family to cope during a cyclone.
- Experiencing a cyclone can be frightening and traumatic. After a cyclone, many essential services may not be working, roads may be closed, food and water could be in short supply and your property or livelihood could be damaged.
- The strong winds produced by a cyclone (up to 280 kilometres per hour) can cause injury, loss of life, major structural damage to communities, disruption of utility and telecommunication services, and turn debris into dangerous missiles.
- Cyclone activity produces strong onshore winds and flooding rains increasing the threat of storm surge. This is a rapid rise in sea level that accompanies a cyclone as it moves ashore.
- Having an emergency kit is an important step to prepare and protect your household for unforeseen events and is essential for short term survival providing vital items for you, your family or household. It is a good idea to always keep your kit in a handy place known to everyone in the household.
- Cyclone Olwyn was the most significant cyclone to affect the Gascoyne coast in decades. Olwyn impacted Carnarvon on the 13th March 2015, causing minor to moderate damage to homes and infrastructure, significant damage to the power network, disruptions to water supply and significant damages to plantations and cropping.

## UNDERSTANDING THE NEW WARNING SYSTEM FOR NATURAL DISASTERS

The warning level will be followed by an action such as "Monitor Conditions" or "Shelter Indoors Now" giving you clear information about how to stay safe. 


