

With the support of the Shire of Carnarvon, the team has been removing large infestations of this aggressive woody weed as part of the Lower Gascoyne Mesquite Management Project. This long-term land rehabilitation effort aims to restore native vegetation and reduce the risks mesquite poses to ecosystems, access routes, and community spaces.

Mesquite (Prosopis spp.), originally from Mexico, is now a declared weed in Western Australia and one of national significance. Known for its deep taproot, rapid spread, and vicious thorns, mesquite can dominate landscapes, restrict wildlife access to water, and make areas unsafe for public use.

While work on public land is progressing, we need your help too. Property owners are encouraged to check for mesquite on their land and assist with its removal. Together, we can make a meaningful impact.

The Shire is also working closely with state government agencies that manage land in the project area to build a coordinated approach towards eradication and long-term control.

SUNSET, SONGS AND SMILES AT BAXTER PARK



SHIRE ENDORSES DRAFT LOCAL PLANNING STRATEGY FOR PUBLIC CONSULTATION



At its May Council Meeting in Coral Bay, the Shire of Carnarvon endorsed the draft Local Planning Strategy (LPS) for public consultation, marking an important step in shaping the region's future growth and development.

The LPS is a vital long-term planning document that sets the strategic direction for land use, infrastructure, and development across the Shire. It ensures future decisions are aligned with community values, state planning policies, and emerging opportunities for economic and population growth.

The draft strategy was informed by extensive early engagement, including community drop-in sessions, stakeholder workshops, and surveys. This feedback has helped shape a clear vision that reflects the aspirations of Carnarvon, Coral Bay, and surrounding areas.

Now endorsed for consultation, the draft will be submitted to the Western Australian Planning Commission for certification before being advertised to the wider public. Community input will again be a key part of the process, with all feedback to be considered before final adoption.

This is a great opportunity for residents, businesses, and landowners to have a say in the Shire's long-term future. Keep an eye out for public consultation dates and help guide the future of land use and development in our region.





Three years ago, Bec made the move from busy, bustling Perth to Carnarvon in search of a slower pace of life, and she's never looked back.

"Only having to drive five minutes to work is such a novelty after dealing with city traffic lights and rush hour."

For Bec, the biggest change hasn't been about starting a business, t's been the joy of daily life in a smaller town.

"Life here is just so much more chill, I feel like I actually have time to connect with my family" she says with a smile, pouring a chail atte behind the counter.

Bec's passion for baking started as a home-based business and quickly grew, with custom cake orders and sourdough deliveries, making her a well-known name around town. Opening a bricks-and-mortar café was the next step, and the realisation of a dream that had been simmering for years.

"I've always loved the idea of owning a little place where people can pop in, have a chat, enjoy a good coffee and something sweet," Bec shared.

To honour this year's theme, Bridging Now to Next, the Shire of Carnarvon Library hosted a Special Reconciliation Week Storytime at Gwoonwardu Mia Cultural Centre on Tuesday 27 May.

Organised by the Shire's Library and Young People's Services Officer, Stephanie Kelly, in collaboration with Barry Belotti, Gwoonwardu Mia Regional Manager Business and Strategy, this unique event shifted the library's usual Storytime session outdoors and onto Country, grounding the experience in place and culture.

Jhameika Bradford, Project Officer at Gwoonwardu Mia, captivated children and families with readings of Baby Business by Jasmine Seymour and I Love Me by Sally Morgan and Ambelin Kwaymullina. These stories, rich in meaning, celebrated cultural identity and self-love in a way that young children could connect with and enjoy.

The morning concluded with a collaborative art activity, where children added handprints and paint to two large canvases. One artwork will be displayed at the Carnarvon Library, and the other at Gwoonwardu Mia, a lasting symbol of community connection.

The event was attended by a wide cross-section of the community including regular Storytime families, KindiLink participants from Carnarvon Community College, and Carnarvon Play and Connect families. Laughter, learning, and creativity made it a special day that was thoroughly enjoyed by all.





National Reconciliation Week is a time for all Australians to learn about our shared histories, cultures, and achievements and to explore how we can contribute to achieving reconciliation in Australia.

It is held each year from 27 May to 3 June, marking two significant milestones in Australia's reconciliation journey:

- The 1967 Referendum, when Australians voted to include Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples in the Census and allow the Federal Government to make laws for them, and
- The 1992 Mabo decision, when the High Court recognised native title, overturning the false concept of terra nulliu, the idea that the land belonged to no one.

The theme for 2025, "Bridging Now to Next", is a reminder that the work of reconciliation is ongoing. It invites all Australians to reflect on the progress made and to commit to meaningful action, building bridges between where we are now and where we need to be in the future.

RAP REFERENCE GROUP MEETS TO SHAPE CARNARVON'S INNOVATE RAP

The Shire of Carnarvon RAP Reference Group, made up of representatives from the Shire, local Aboriginal Corporations, and community members, met on the final day of Reconciliation Week, poignantly, on 3 June, during Reconciliation Week.



This meeting was the first gathering following the recent endorsement by Reconciliation Australia if the Shire of Carnarvon's Innovate Reconciliation Action Plan 2025-2027. This is the Shire's second RAP, building on the foundations of our previous "Reflect" RAP and taking our commitment further. The focus areas for this RAP are cultural learning, building partnerships, developing employment and procurement strategies, and embedding reconciliation in everyday practices. This is a critical phase in our ongoing reconciliation journey, where we focus on building strong relationships, honouring truth-telling, and looking forward with unity and respect.

Shire President Eddie Smith said: "Our Innovate RAP represents a significant step forward in our journey towards reconciliation. It outlines practical actions that we will undertake to promote cultural awareness, celebrate Yinggarda and Baiyungu cultures, and contribute to great outcomes for First Nations peoples. I encourage all members of the Carnarvon community to embrace this initiative and actively participate in its implementation. Together, let us work towards a future where reconciliation with First Nations peoples is a lived reality, one in which the histories, cultures, and contributions of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples are acknowledged and respected, fostering a community where all can thrive and prosper."

RECONCILIATION EXHIBITION: BRIDGING NOW TO NEXT

Thank you to everyone who joined us on 16 June for the opening of Bridging Now to Next, our 2025 Reconciliation Week exhibition. A heartfelt Welcome to Country by Yinggarda Elder Lucy Bulley set the tone for a powerful night of reflection, connection and celebration of local talent.

Inspired by the National Reconciliation Week theme from Reconciliation Australia, the exhibition invites the community to consider what reconciliation means for our region and how we can move forward together. The theme and artist briefs were shaped in collaboration with local Elders, the Shire's RAP Reference Group and community members through a co-design process with the Community Art Hub.

SAFE BURNING IN THE COOLER MONTHS

As we move into the cooler months, it might feel like fire risks have eased — but it's still vital to practise safe burning when lighting any kind of fire, including burn-offs, campfires, or cooking fires.

While fire permits are only required from 1 October to 30 April in the Shire of Carnarvon, the risk of fires getting out of control doesn't disappear with the heat. Windy days, dry vegetation, or unattended flames can still pose serious dangers to people, property, and the environment.

We remind all residents to:

- 🖖 Check the daily Fire Danger Rating before burning
- Avoid lighting fires on windy or dry days
- Keep a water source nearby
- Clear the area around your fire
- 🖖 Never leave a fire unattended


TO MAKE IT SAFE FOR OUR COLLECTORS:

- Items are to be placed out the day before or by 6am on the day of collection


